Some of them expressed the belief that a reduction of 10 per ceht in the retail price of meats may be made in a few days, should the present money stringency continue.

For sev-eral weeks fresh ergs have sold at 27 cents a dozen retall, and the "cooled" variety at 23 cents. In south Water street many dealers were quoting the best creamery but-ter at 26 cents a pould wholesale. This probably will cause a reduction in the retail price of from 35 cents to 30 and 31 cents a pound.

LUMBER RATES.

Shippers Seek Injunction Against Hill And Harriman Roads.

San Francisce, Oct. 30.--A big ad-vance on lumber shipments from this state to all eastern points goes into ef-fect Friday. About 12,000 cars of fir and 5,000 cars of redwood are annually shipped from California to the east, and advance in rates is equal to \$30 a
