Board Orders Free Text Books for Pupils-Balance in Treasury.

Want Principal Wilson of High school to Remain-Another Holdup-District Court.

The board of education held its regular session last evening, transacting considerable important business.

The committee on new text books reported giving its estimate of the cost of books for the common school grades at \$6,000 and of text book for the High school at \$3,000 making a total of \$9,600 and the committee was instructed to order the books from the various publishing houses from whom bids have been received. The text books to be used by the common school pupils will used by the common school pupils will be furnished gratis, the text books used by the High school pupils will be fur-nished at cost. They will be distrib-uted from some house in the city, which will be selected by the board.

While selected by the board. The board during the past year has been very conservative in its expendi-tures and will have a few thouand dol-lars in the treasury at the close of the school year, but the purchasing of the new text books will take all the bal-.nce in the treasury and possibly more, as the present order for \$6,000 worth of books for the city school pupils will not be sufficient and a second order will have to be sent later. The treasurer recash on hand at the present time

\$13,499.01. The teachers committee is working hard to prepare the list of teachers for the school year of 1903-4. The commit-tee will be ready to report on the list of teachers the early part of next week. At the request of Principal Wilson of the High school, its field day was fixed for May 30 at Glenwood park. The gram-mar grade schools will have their field day at the same place one day earlier. The committee receiving bids on suppies from the various business houses for the coming school year was given one more week in which to receive bids. The board informally discussed the part which the school children shall take in the parade and reception to be given President Roosevelt when he visits Ogden the latter part of this month, but no definite action was taken. Over 20 applications for positions as teachers were received and filed. An effort is being made by the many friends of Frincipal Wilson of the High school to induce him to reconsider his

cceptance of the position offered him t the Agricultural college at Logan, and to remain here in Ogden. His ex-cellent work as principal of the High school and the progress which the school has made under his supervision has caused his friends and the patrons of the school to use their every to induce him to remain here realizing as they do that it would be hard to find a man to fill his place. Mr. Wilson is seriously considering the matter and may deride to stay here.
