

"BOMBING" HABIT HITS ARGENTINA

President Figueroa Alcorta Saves
His Own Life in the
Nick of Time.

WOULD-BE FIEND IN JAIL.

Alde-de-Camp and Police Arrest So-
lario Regis and Three Other Sus-
pects—Prisoner Believed Insane.

Buenos Ayres, Feb. 28.—D. J. Figueroa Alcorta, president of the republic, early this evening was the object of an abortive attempt at assassination at the hands of a native of Argentina. He hurled a crude bomb at the president as the latter alighted from his carriage in front of his residence. The missile did not explode. The miscreant, who is believed to be insane, was arrested, and three other persons who were acting in a suspicious manner also were taken into custody by the police.

Dr. Alcorta was not at all perturbed. He considers the action that of an insane man.

The following official statement regarding the occurrence was given out at the residence of President Alcorta tonight:

"This excellency was alighting from a carriage about 6 o'clock this evening when an individual who afterward was identified as an Argentine of mixed blood named Solario Regis, dropped at the president's feet a bomb, which happily did not explode.

ALCORTA KICKED THE BOMB.

"Dr. Alcorta with great coolness promptly kicked the infernal machine away from him, while his aide-de-camp, Capt. Anabla, seized the criminal and prevented his escape.

"The police immediately procured a pail of water, into which they placed the bomb, which emitted a sulphurous odor.

"President Alcorta meantime had turned to exhortation with his would-be assassin, but owing to the possibility of the bomb still exploding, he was gently forced by his aide-de-camp upon the porch of his residence.

"The police afterward arrested three men prowling in the neighborhood as suspicious characters.

"The bomb was made from a common paint can, and is believed to contain about 10 kilos of explosives.

"The excellency showed no sign of perturbation during the incident, merely attributing the act to an unbalanced brain."

As soon as news of the occurrence became public all the ministers, the chief of police, high officials and many personal friends hastened to the president's house and congratulated him upon his escape.

COXEY OF "ARMY" FAME IS AUTHOR OF A BILL.

Washington, Feb. 28.—Mr. Drum of Pennsylvania today introduced in the house a bill, at the request of "General" Jacob S. Coxey, to provide for public improvements and employment of the citizens of the United States, to encourage industry and produce prosperity and to procure money to purchase and pay for public utilities, and for the redemption of said money.

The bill provides that when there is a surplus production with no demand for labor at living wages, states, territories, counties, townships, municipalities or incorporated towns and villages may, for the purpose of employing idle men and women on public works, issue non-interest bearing twenty-five-year bonds, not in excess of one-half of the assessed valuation of their real estate, these bonds to be deposited with the secretary of the treasury, who shall issue treasury notes on this security, the money to be used in employment of idle persons at a minimum rate of \$1.50 a day for common labor, women to be paid the same as men, and eight hours to constitute a day's work. The bonds are refundable at the interest rate of 4 per cent.

DEADLOCK AT INDIANAPOLIS.

Indianapolis, Ind., Feb. 28.—At the joint meeting of coal miners and operators of western Pennsylvania, Ohio and Illinois today, a motion offered by H. L. Chapman of the Ohio operators, providing for an extension of the present wage scale from April 1 to April 30, was defeated, as was also a motion to adjourn until March 10. National Secretary Wilson of the miners said he would not consent to this unless a settlement was imposed. There were practically no prospects of an agreement.

LONDON'S WOMEN WIN THEIR WAR

Suffragettes Gather Before
Houses of Parliament When
Bill Passes.

PARTY LINES WERE IGNORED.

With a Vote of 271 to 92 Henry Yorke
Stanger's Measure Favorably
Received.

London, Feb. 28.—The woman's enfranchisement bill passed its first reading in the house of commons this forenoon by a vote of 271 to 92, and as soon as the news reached Westminster palace the waiting crowds of excited women suffragettes who had assembled there broke into round about round of cheers. The measure, which was introduced by Henry Yorke Stanger, liberal member for North Kensington, is identical with the bill of W. H. Dickinson, member of the house for the north division of St. Pancras, which was defeated March 8, 1907.

GLADSTONE'S SPEECH.

Herbert Gladstone, the home secretary, spoke in behalf of the government, and said he left the decision of the house to the views of its individual members. He declared that, personally, he favored the principles of the bill, but he thought that the great public opinion would have to be moved before any effect could be given to it. Undoubtedly, Mr. Gladstone continued, there has been a great and growing movement in favor of granting suffrage to women, but it still lacks numbers and it has not been demonstrated that women, as a whole, desire to secure the privilege of voting. Party lines were completely ignored in the voting.

CROWDS WERE WAITING.

Great crowds of women awaited the result in the vicinity of the house of commons and a strong detachment of police, mounted on foot, had been brought up to guard against possible disturbance. Beyond cheering the known supporters of the women's movement, however, there was little demonstration and the women soon dispersed to attend congratulatory meetings, where their future course of action was discussed.

JOY FOR MCKINLEY IN THIS.

Portland, Ore., Feb. 28.—Horace G. McKinley, convicted of land frauds in this state, was today sentenced to serve two years in the Multnomah county jail and to pay a fine of \$7,500. McKinley was wildly excited when he learned he was not to be sent to McNeil's island, and his joy was unstrained. It is understood that the light sentence imposed is preliminary to McKinley becoming a witness for the government in cases yet to be called.

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PRIZE COMES TO UTAH

Hiram Jensen of Collinston Scores at
Lumbermen's Convention

At Tacoma.

Tacoma, Wash., Feb. 28.—The second day's session of the convention of the Western Retail Lumbermen's association opened this morning with a meeting of the Lumber Mutual association, a co-operative fire insurance company among members of the association.

President F. H. Hilliard of Tekoa, Wash., reports that in spite of the efforts of the old line companies to induce members to leave the mutual by offering low rates, the mutual had prospered and increased in membership and assets. The operation of the mutual has reduced the cost of insurance to lumbermen from 15 to 62 per cent during the four years of its existence, and is now furnishing insurance at an average of about 50 per cent less than the regular rates. Seventy-four per cent of the losses last year started from spontaneous combustion in coal bins.

The report of Secy-Treas. Porter showed assets of \$50,000, liabilities \$37,000; insurance in force, \$1,500,000.

F. H. Hilliard was re-elected president; J. C. Weeter of Pocatello vice

president; A. L. Porter, Spokane, secretary-treasurer.

The first prize of \$50 for the best essay on "A Modern Steel Lumber Yard" was awarded to Hiram Jensen of Collinston, Utah; second prize, \$40, to J. F. Hertzler of Woodburn, Or.

The Hoo-Hoo contention took place tonight and about 50 candidates from the western states were initiated.

The attendance today is more than 500, and the convention is said to be the best in the history of the association.
