MOVEMENTS OF PRESIDENT TAYLOR AND PARTY.

Editor Deseret News:

On Monday, Nov. 28, 1881, at 9.45 a.m., President Taylor and party started for Salt Lake, and after a pleasant drive of two and three quarters hours, arrived and were suitably provided for by Bishop Jens Jensen and his brethren.

At 2 p.m., a meeting was held, the meeting-house being too small to contain one half of the Saints who were assembled. Presidents Taylor and Woodruff and Elder Richards were the speakers.

At 6.30 a meeting of the young people was held at which President Woodruff and Elders Nuttall and Richards spoke.

Tuesday, Nov. 29.

As per arrangements made last evening President Taylor and Elders Richards and Nuttall started at 9 a.m. for Gunnison and President Woodruff for Mayfield to hold meetings. Three brethren well mounted accompanied the party from Salt Lake, and Elder Clark was his mother-in-law.

A slight flurry of snow fell last night. President Taylor and party arrived at Gunnison at 11 o'clock. Here we met Apostle F. M. Lyman and Prest. Ira Hinckley who had arrived from Fillmore last evening and held a meeting. It was decided as per consultation last night that Elder F. D. Richards proceed direct to Juab this afternoon thence to Salt Lake City and Ogden tomorrow to enable him to attend to matters of importance in which he was concerned.

Elder Berglund provided a suitable team and carriage and Bro. Richards left at 12.30.

At the meeting which commenced at 11 o'clock, Prest. Taylor, Apostle Lyman and Elder Nuttall spoke to the assembled Saints.

At 3.25 started for Mayfield, and arrived at 5.30. Here we met by Prest. Jos. F. Smith, Apostle J. H. Smith, and Elder C. W. Penrose, who arrived this afternoon from Salt Lake City.

Prest. Woodruff held meeting at Mayfield at 11 a.m., when he and Elder House, of Nephi, spoke to the Saints. These brethren arrived at Mayfield at 4.30.

At 7 o'clock the Saints assembled in the meeting-house and were addressed by Elder Penrose, Prest. Jos. F. Smith, Lyman, Smith and Prest. Taylor.

Wednesday, Nov. 30.

A fine pleasant morning.

The President and party drove to the Temple grounds, walked through the building and surroundings. The labor having progressed very favorably during the past year.

Apostles Lyman and Smith proceeded to Ephraim to attend the opening services of the quarterly conference.

A DESPERADO ARRESTED.

A WYOMING COWBOY CAUGHT NAPPING.

Sheriff Dickey, of Evanston, came to this city yesterday, in search of two desperate characters—cowboys. An attempt had been made to capture them at Evanston, some time since, which failed, as the desperados stood the officers off with their pistols.

The sheriff made the police acquainted with his errand, and they kept a look out for the men. At 3.30 this morning, Officer Salmon thought he saw one of them, Jack Williams, sitting by the stove in the White House. To make certain, he found Mr. Dickey, who at once recognized Williams. The latter was sitting on a chair dozing, but Mr. Dickey knowing that the cowboy would shoot on sight, was even then cautious about approaching him.

Mr. Salmon, however, walked up and put the bracelets on Williams before he was aware of what was using done.

Williams and his companion are charged with horse stealing. He seems to have an intense hatred of Mr. Dickey, and vows vengeance against him. While in the city jail he tried to free himself from the handcuffs by beating them against the wall. He destroyed the lock on them, and as his wrists were swollen and discolored, they had to be removed by the aid of a blacksmith, this afternoon, and ankle-irons put on him in place of them.

This afternoon he laughingly told a News reporter that he guessed they would hang him when they got him back to Evanston, but he didn't know as it mattered much, anyhow.

Williams is of medium height, strongly built, evidently possessing great muscular strength, and activity. His features are broad, his nose having a protuberance on the upper part, which physiognomists say denotes aggressiveness. When not angry, he smiles broadly, and has an air of jaunty juvenility. He is the beau ideal of a cowboy of the toughest stripe.

Murderers Sentenced.—Michael Mooney, murderer of Joel Hinckley, was, on Tuesday last, at Malad City, Idaho, sentenced to be hanged on the 20th of January next.

Barnes, a participant in the same crime, having been found guilty of murder in the second degree, was sentenced to imprisonment in the penitentiary, for 15 years.

Burglary at Ogden.—Burglars entered the gun manufactory of J. M. Browning & Co., Ogden, on Thursday night, and carried away eighteen pistols of various kinds. Thieves seem to be doing a lively business in our neighboring city in the north and vicinity. The Ogden Herald gives the details of the burglary.

PRIESTHOOD MEETING.

The regular meeting of the Priesthood of this Stake convened in the Assembly Hall at 11 o'clock this morning. There were present on the stand: Angus M. Cannon and Joseph E. Taylor of the Presidency of the Stake, and others.

Elder George Goddard reported that the work on the Assembly Hall was now finished, and the vote taken at a previous meeting to pay off the debt as appertained to the several wards was like to be complied with soon, from present indications, and the committee hoped that the house could be dedicated free from debt at the next Conference of the Stake.

President A. M. Cannon requested Brother Goddard to report to him any wards that had not raised the amount appertained to them within two weeks from date, so that the Presidency of the Stake could take other measures to raise the means, if necessary, even to calling on the Relief Societies to help each ward out, as they were anxious to have the building dedicated at the coming conference.

The speaker urged upon young men who were recommended to be ordained Elders, the importance of attending their Quorum meetings, and of being diligent in the performance of all their duties; making any necessary sacrifice to do so. Great promises were made to those who observed the counsels contained in the Word of Wisdom, and we should endeavor to live worthy of them.

A circular from the Presidency of the Stake, to be distributed to the Bishops, was read. It calls their attention to the circular of the Apostles in regard to dancing parties and other amusements, and was submitted to the action of the meeting.

President Joseph E. Taylor addressed a few pointed remarks to the brethren, showing the necessity for a circular of the kind above referred to. He also spoke upon the importance of kindly but firmly and consistently using an influence with the young to lead them in the ways of God. Presiding officers of the Stake would have much more influence in their wards than those who yielded to the foolish caprices of the young for the sake of winning them over.

Brother Robert Patrick endorsed the sentiments contained in the circular.

Bishop A. C. Pyper said he also did so as far as it went, but felt that it would be an easier matter to entirely do away with round dancing than to restrict them to "one or two."

He also spoke upon and deplored the tendency among the young people in getting married without the sanction of the church, and the injustice of the peace instead of in the way the Lord had provided.

President A. M. Cannon showed the folly of the young getting married before the justice of the peace, and thus cutting themselves off from the blessings of the Lord's House, but where persons were not worthy to be recommended there, and they were determined to get married, Bishops, if requested, were authorized to marry them as ministers of the gospel, but such persons would have to wait until they could be recommended there, and they were worthy of going to a Temple before they could be married according to the order of God. The Presidency of the Stake did not feel authorized to require Bishops to do more than they were required to do by the First Presidency of the Church, but would say, if any of the Bishops felt like doing away entirely with round dancing, they would be sustained in it by the Presidency of the Stake, but none were authorized to have more than the number specified in the circular.

The circular was then endorsed by unanimous vote of the meeting.

The Bishops of the city wards were requested to send five men each to attend the Assembly of the First Ward tomorrow, and so on consecutively.

It was announced that there would be a Conference of this Stake held on Saturday and Sunday, Jan. 7th and 8th, 1882, commencing at 10 a.m. on the 7th, in the Salt Lake Assembly Hall.

The meeting was adjourned until that time.
