

PLANKS FOR THE CHICAGO PLATFORM

They Have Been Decided on at Various Conferences Held at The White House.

FOR ROOSEVELT POLICIES.

Will Take Advanced Ground on Tariff, Control of Trusts, Currency and Power Over Trusts.

Cincinnati, O., June 2.—The planks to be presented to the Republican national convention at Chicago, as decided on at various conferences at the White House, are given in a Washington special to the Times-Star, as follows:

The Chicago platform will take advanced ground on the tariff, on control of the trusts, on the amending of the Sherman law, on the currency and on the question of limiting the power of injunctions.

It will stand squarely in other regards on the policies which have been the success of the Roosevelt administration. In the rough it will be drafted by Wade Ellis, attorney-general of Ohio, who will return to Virginia Beach for that purpose tonight.

Such were among the decisions reached at a White House conference last night. There have been erroneous reports as to the identity of those who attended that conference, destined to be a historic one. The accurate list is as follows:

President Roosevelt, Secy. Taft, Secy. of the Interior, Garfield, Atty. Gen. Wade Ellis of Ohio, Senator Long of Kansas, Senator Hopkins of Illinois, Frank B. Kellogg, national committee-man from Minnesota; Congressman Longworth of Cincinnati, and William Loeb, secretary to the president.

There were additional conferences today, Atty. Gen. Ellis being closeted with Secy. Taft. Other conferences are to follow.

At last night's White House meeting the entire subject was discussed. The topics most exhaustively considered were the tariff, trusts, control of the railroads, currency and conservation of natural resources, improvement of waterways, Cuba, Porto Rico, the Philippines and the Panama canal. The order in which these topics are to be presented to the convention was tentatively agreed upon, subject of course to the approval of the resolutions committee of the convention.

Atty. Gen. Ellis presented a plan providing for an amendment to the Sherman law, under the provisions of which harmless agreements among mercantile associations which seek not to create monopolies or to fix and control prices, are to be null and void.

MEXICO WILL ENACT NO NEW MINING LAWS

City of Mexico, June 2.—It is now stated in conservative circles that no new mining laws will be enacted during the present session. The vigorous opposition to the proposed anti-foreign clause of the proposed new legislation has borne fruit. The minister for fomento, Senor Nolme, has expressed a wish that any legislation having for its purpose a new mining code be given long and careful consideration. The present law which has been in force since June 4, 1892, has been found to have been very satisfactory, but certain amendments to it are made necessary and these will only be adopted after radical and conservative elements have been heard and the whole matter carefully considered.

EXPRESS CHARGES.

Government Brings Suit to Recover Excessive Ones.

Washington, June 2.—A complaint unique in the annals of the interstate commerce commission was filed today. It is entitled "The United States against the Adams Express company and the Northern Pacific Express company." The complaint is entered by Secy. Metcalf in his official capacity as secretary of the navy, and is a protest against what is termed the excessive, unreasonable and unjust charges on naval stores between Washington, D. C., and Bremerton, Wash. It appears that certain naval supplies were shipped by express from Washington to Bremerton, on which the charge was \$11.75 per 100 pounds. The complaint alleges that the charge should have been not more than \$10.35 per 100 pounds, and that the difference of \$1.40 on the amount of \$14.99 on the shipment.

GASTON P. PHILLIPS ACQUITTED.

Washington, June 2.—Gaston P. Phillips, civil engineer and club man of New York and Washington, was acquitted of the murder of Frank Mac Aboy, a cab driver, by a jury in criminal court No. 2 here tonight. The jury returned its verdict of "not guilty" after having been out an hour and 12 minutes.

J. H. HAMMOND FOR VICE PRESIDENT

Great Mining Engineer Has Decided to Enter the Race For the Nomination.

WILL HAVE HEADQUARTERS.

Is Being Urged on the Ground That He is a Californian by Birth And is a Business Man.

Washington, June 2.—After consideration of the suggestion of his western friends, John Hays Hammond has decided to enter the contests for the nomination for vice president on the Republican ticket. He is being urged by his friends on the ground that he is a Californian by birth, has a very intimate knowledge of all problems, political and economic, affecting the west, and is now a resident of Gloucester, Mass. Mr. Hammond was formerly connected with the Guggenheim Mining company, but has no connection with the smelting trust. Besides this, Mr. Hammond has the advantage, it is urged, of a strong following among business men, and this, it is considered, may be an important feature of his candidacy. For the past year Mr. Hammond has been engaged independently in his professional work as mining engineer, without any connection with mining companies.

Mr. Hammond was in Washington today, and it was after several conferences with his political friends that the decision was reached to make announcement of his candidacy.

John B. Montgomery of Colorado will leave for Chicago tomorrow to establish headquarters in the Auditorium Annex in the interest of the candidacy of John Hays Hammond for the Republican vice presidential nomination.

DE CHAULNES DIED IN ATTITUDE OF PRAYER

New York, June 2.—On his return from Paris today, Theodore Shonts, president of the Interborough Metropolitan company, declared that the reports that the death of his son-in-law, the Duc de Chaules, was due to indulgence in opiates were infamous lies. Mr. Shonts said that the duke's death was caused by heart disease, and that he was not addicted to the use of drugs.

"The duke and my daughter were kneeling at their bedside in prayer," said Mr. Shonts, "when the stroke came upon him that carried him off before medical aid could be summoned."

"The memory of the duke has been grossly maligned, and outrageous reports were printed about the manner and cause of his death. The facts are these:

"On the afternoon of the day on which he died, the duke and my daughter were out riding. They dined together, and then retired to their apartment early."

"They were kneeling close together, and the duke held one arm about his wife's shoulders. Suddenly, he lurched forward and then tumbled unconscious at my daughter's feet. He was a big man and she a slight girl, but she lifted him bodily upon the bed and screamed for aid. He was dead before anything could be done for him."

FALLING OFF IN CANAL EXCAVATION

Washington, June 2.—A falling off of over a half million cubic yards in excavation on the isthmian canal for May as compared with April is shown in a despatch received at the canal commission today from Engineer Goetzels. The decrease is attributed mainly to great rainfalls. The May excavation was but 2,708,923 cubic yards.

SPEAKER CANNON OPENS HEADQUARTERS

Chicago, June 2.—Political headquarters for J. G. Cannon were opened today in the Auditorium hotel by John Eversman, acting for Congressman William B. McKinley. Champagney, Ill., who will arrive later in the week to take charge.

"GASPIPE THUGS" TO DIE.

San Francisco, June 2.—John Stensen and Louis Dahner, known as the "gaspipe thugs," who confessed to committing many sensational assaults and robberies during the autumn following the great fire of 1906, and who were convicted of murdering M. Managata, a Japanese banker, were today sentenced by Judge Cook to be executed at San Quentin on July 31.

SENATOR PLATT SUED.

For Debts Contracted by Mrs. Lillian Janeway Platt.

New York, June 2.—A suit was brought in the supreme court today against United States Senator Thomas C. Platt by a law firm to recover \$2,471 which the plaintiff claimed it had paid for debts contracted by Mrs. Lillian Janeway Platt shortly before her separation agreement with Senator Platt was executed in 1906. The plaintiff alleges that Senator Platt was to pay all the bills incurred by his wife prior to their separation.

VIVISECTION.

Am. Medical Association Opposed to Laws for its Abolishment.

Chicago, May 2.—Vivisection came in for much attention by delegates to the convention of the American Medical Association, which opened here today, and will be the subject of significant action by the governing board of that organization. By a unanimous vote the house of delegates approved a recommendation to the board of trustees to create a commission, the sole duty of which shall be to watch and oppose the enactment of laws intended to abolish vivisection. This action was under consideration, Dr. W. B. Cannon, chairman of the section on pathology, advocated a campaign of education against opponents of the practice, who he accused of untruthfulness and ignorance, and in another meeting—that of the section on surgery—results of animal experimentation were being described by Dr. Alexis Carrel of New York. CRIMINAL MURDERS HIS FAMILY, COMMITS SUICIDE

Labell, Mo., June 2.—Fear that his home would be attacked should his early life of crime become known, is believed to have caused Bert McMillin yesterday to shoot and instantly kill his wife, Mrs. Mamie McMillin, and two children, Frank, aged 5, and Opal, aged 6, and then send a bullet through his own brain. The tragedy occurred on the ranch of Whitmore Thomas, near here, and was witnessed by two farm hands.

It developed tonight that McMillin was at one time a member of the famous Dalton gang of outlaws that

terrorized western Kansas and eastern Oklahoma 15 years ago, and that his brother Gus, also a member of that gang, was shot to death in Oklahoma. Since coming here last October McMillin has had very little to say to his neighbors, and it is believed he lived in constant dread lest his past life become known. It is said that Mrs. McMillin often confided to friends that her husband was constantly worrying and that she was at a loss to account for his actions. McMillin was 30 years of age, and his wife 27. They had been married 10 years.

A DEATH PACT.

Man and Married Woman, Who Loved Each Other, Carried It Out.

Wilkesbarre, Pa., June 2.—Sebastian Gulya, a clerk in a wholesale liquor house in this city, and Mrs. Anna Karesva, a married woman,

whose husband had deserted her, entered into a death pact today. Both were found dead in a room in the home of the woman at Kingston, near here. They had made all preparations for the tragedy, being dressed in holiday attire and wearing buttonhole bouquets. Both left letters saying they loved each other, but owing to the fact that the husband of the woman was still alive they realized they could not get married, and they concluded to give up life. The man shot the woman first and then turned the revolver upon himself.
