#### EXPRESS CHARGES.

#### Government Brings Suit to Recover Excessive Ones.

Washington, June 2 .- A complaint unique in the annals of the Interstate commerce commission was filed today. It is entitled "The United States against the Adams Express company and the Northern Pacific Express com-pany." The complaint is entered by Secy. Metcalf in his official capa-city as secretary of the navy, and is a protest against what is termed the ex-cessive, unreasonable and unjust charges on naval stores between Washington, D. C., and Bremerton, Wash. It appears that certain naval supplies were shipped by express from Washington to Bremerton, on which the charge was \$11.75 per 100 pounds. The complaint alleges that the charge should have been not more than \$10.35 per 100 pounds, and reparation is de-manded to the amount of \$14.99 on the shipment. unique in the annals of the interstate
