There was a luncheon party at the Commercial club yesterday afternoon, at which were present Senators Smoot and Sutherland, Congressman Howell, ex-Gov. H. M. Wells, Capit. J. E. Caine, J. W. Houston, L. H. Farns-worth and J. G. McDonald. The party brought up the matter of Fort Douglas as a brigade post, and late in the afternoon the following telegram was sent to President Roosavelt and Secy. Taft, by the Utah congressional delegation: "Fort Douglas is admirably sit-uated for purposes of a brigade post, with exceptional facilities for the transportation of troops and supplies, We carnestly request your favorable consideration of the proposition to make it one of the brigade posts."
