Parker, Idaho, Jan. 31 .- The winter here so far has been quite mild, though very changeable. There is scarcely

now enough to make good sleighing. The immigration into this country kept up till winter set in. This entire neighborhood is dotted with sheep, and it is next to impossible to buy hay. Grain raising will not be the leading industry in the future. The price of all cereals has been very low for time. At the present wheat is 54 cents per 100 pounds; oats 75 cents. Hay on the other hand brings a good price, and requires much less labor. Many cattle have also been brought in, and are be ing fed up preparatory to shipment, as well as for the local beef market.
