A New Commissioner.-By reference to our dispatches, it will be seen that there is another change in the Utah Commission, President Cleveland having to-day appointed Secretary Arthur L. Thomas to that body. Another Gravel Bank Caves -Yesterday a force of Utah Central employes were working at one of the gravel beds on the Sevier River, when the bank caved in, covering John Thomas Powell. He was taken out by his fellow-workmen, when it was found that his leg had been broken below the knee, and he had received some slight bruises. He was brought to this city last night on a special train, and received surgical attendance. The injury to the limb is rather a severe one of its kind.

Foot Amputated .- Robert Holmes, writing from St. Johns, Arizona, under date of the 28th ult., says in relation to the case of James W. This was successfully performed by Dr. Wm. E. Dalby, the patient being under the influence of chleroform. He is now doing well.

He lived in a house on the farm in bachelor style, and was all right when seen by Mr. Wilson last Sunday. Yesterday he was found dead in bed, and it is supposed he died dur-ing Sunday night. He was in a sitting posture with his arms folded and the cause of death is supposed to be heart disease, as deceased has complained of heart trouble for some time. He was about 46 years of age and served in the army for 22 years; he was expecting to receive a pension shortly. A coroner's inquest was to be held this atternoon.—Ogden Herald.
