OVERLAND MAIL MAN. Something of the Late H. S. Ramfield

Who Died in Ohio.

The late H. S. Rumfield, whose remains were recently brought to this. city from Gnio, for interment in Mt. Olivet, well known in Utah business circles, and was a connection by marringe with Judge Standrod of Idaho, Mr. Rumfield was born at Tiffin, Ohlo, Feb. 14, 1813, and came to Utah in 1855, in the employ of the Overland mail. He was first engaged as an accountant with this company, and after the death of Mr. Cook, became its manager. For a few years he was away from this territory returning later to act as superintendent of the smelters at Stockton. But the atmospheric surroundings affected Mr. Rumfield's health unfavorably, and he found a change nee-essary. So he entered the hardware establishment of George M. Scott & Co., of this city, where he acted very acceptably as secretary and treasurer for 17 years. In this position, as in others, he had held, Mr. Rumfield was noted for his accuracy and scrupulous honesty, winning the esteem of all who met him; and citizens who knew the deceased intimately say that many out-side of business circles had reason to love and honor the man as his deeds of mercy were many, and that he practices that noble charity which does not allow the dock hand to know what practices that noble charity which does not allow the right hand to know what the left hand is about. Mr. Rumfield returned to his former Ohio home a few years since, and resided there until his death from appoplexy. Dec. 22 last. The funeral services were held in Ohio.
