NOT A PASSENGER WAS LOST

Some Held Indignation Meeting—For
Some Reason Wireless Appar-
atus Would Not Work.

Speculation concerning the failure of the wireless plant aboard the vessel to send out "C. O. D." or "S. O. S." messages was quieted today by a statement from F. L. Flisburn, the wireless operator aboard the St. Croix.

"Immediately after the alarm was sounded," said Flisburn, "I started to send out 'C. O. D.' or 'S. O. S.' messages but I could not keep them up, so my companion sent a spark flash out. After a short time before I had received a message sent to me by a friend at San Pedro, so the wireless apparatus was all right. The power had been shut off, that's all. Every bit of the energy developed by the boilers had been turned, I afterward learned, to working the pumps."

Members of the steward's crew protested the loss of the wireless apparatus, also the effects of the personal losses. Most of them were in their white dining uniforms when the alarm was given. They had no time to change, and the cold night breezes off the sea kept them shivering and shaking until tiny citizens of the beach district gave them clothing. They appeared at the dinner table the company gained in numbers.

Another development resulting from the destruction of the St. Croix is the cutting of the rate war that has been fought during the last two months between the Hamilton concern and the Pacific Coast Steamship company. An announcement is expected today from the officers of the latter that the old rate of \$12.50 between here and San Francisco will go into effect almost immediately.

Discussed Situation—No Information Given Out as to What Was Determined On.

Washington, Nov. 21.—Following a conference with the president at the White House tonight on the Nicaraguan situation, Secy. of State Knox submitted the following statement:

"If certain representations of fact which have been made to the state department concerning the Groes and Cannon case are verified by inquiries that have been made, this government will at once prepare a demand on the Nicaraguan government for reparation for the death of these two men."

For two hours tonight President Taft conferred with Secy. Knox on the Nicaraguan situation. The secretary was accompanied by Henry M. Hoyt, counsel of the state department. Mr. Hoyt conferred with Assistant Secy. of State Wilson.

It was announced that neither the secretary nor the White House would discuss in any way the pending difficulty with Nicaragua, and the president and Mr. Knox agreed tacitly to make any comment on their talk. The secretary carried a formidable array of papers to the White House and Counselor Hoyt also carried a bulging portfolio.

The only other event of importance today was the dispatch of orders to the transport Buffalo, on duty on the Pacific coast, to sail at once for Panama. The navy department's instructions to the commander of the Buffalo were clear and explicit, and the vessel was expected to sail tonight from Pichilemu bay, Chile.

This ordering of the Buffalo south on her regular schedule is taken to mean that this government is making ready to throw a column of United States marines into the Nicaraguan turmoil for the protection of American lives and property.

Any expedition against Nicaragua in which the marines figure would be undertaken on the Pacific coast of the isthmus. The Buffalo would land the men at the port of Corinto, 40 miles from Managua.

ITALIAN ATTACKED
BY BLACK HAND MEMBERS

Chicago, Nov. 22.—Antonio Bondi, an Italian merchant, was attacked early yesterday morning by three men supposed to be members of the Black Hand society. Four shots were fired through the window of Bondi's hotel room, armed with a shotgun, fired twice at the men who attacked him, but it is not known whether anyone was hurt. Bondi says one of the men limped as he ran away. Bondi had received three letters at intervals since Oct. 14 demanding \$500. The last, a few days ago, warned him that if he did not comply he and his family would be attacked. He placed a shotgun within easy reach when he went to bed and when the men came he fired a few shots at them. The shots were heard by policemen in the vicinity, but when they arrived the street was quiet. No arrests have been made.

PASSENGERS VERY INDIGNANT.

Many of the passengers held an indignation meeting last night and agreed that the intention of confronting the officers of the company with claims for damages on account of the failure of the company to take them from their camp at Zuni canyon after they escaped from the ship. Charles H. Hamilton, one of the officers of the company, is expected here today to meet the situation.

The police stations and the hospitals were thrown open to the passengers, who lost all in the wreck.

Mrs. L. A. Wallace of Berkeley, who was injured and nearly drowned with her 6-month-old baby while the boat was being launched, left the hospital at 11 o'clock this morning and will leave for her home this afternoon. Her husband, who dived off the upper works of the ship when he saw her and the baby struggling in the water, had suffered no ill effects. His and Sidney Finley, a ship's pantryman and Quartermaster Harry Quigley, who plunged to the rescue with him, were hailed as the chief heroes of the wreck.

Among others who left San Francisco was Mrs. Charles Velvain and her 6-year-old son, Herbert, who was also saved from drowning when the boat was being lowered. They are plumb-headed first into the sea. They were accompanied by Mrs. Grace Thomas of Vancouver who aided in the saving of the lad.

Costly gowns and presents worth \$1,500, which were to have figured in the wedding of Mrs. Ethel Hoskins of this city to Richard McGill Andrews in Japan, Dec. 14, were among the heavy losses.

Mrs. Hoskins was on her way with the trousseau and presents to San Francisco whence she was to have sailed on the day of the wreck.
