BUTTE DOCTOR IN TROUBLE.

Arrested by Liberty Park Policeman at a Preacher's House.

Park Officer Brown last night arrested Dr. W. L. Gardner, a Butte physician on the grave charge of taking improper liberties with Flora Hansen, a 10-year-old girl. It is alleged that the act was committed early in the evening in the park where the child had gone with Gardner. 'Two ladies first noticed the man's actions and becoming alarmed for the child's safety, notified Officer Brown. The officer then watched Gardner and saw him take liberties with the child while swinging her in a secluded part of the

park. The officer followed him to the home of Rev. A. J. Osborne at 665 South, Fourth East, where he is stopping. Gardner was placed under ar-orst there and taken to the station. Officer Brown says that questioned the child she said that Gardner had taken liberties with her and, according to the officer's statement, the doctor admitted it to be true, but says he did not realize what he was doing

At the station Rev. Osborne, of the Seventh-day Adventists begged for Gardner's release, saying he knew the man had done nothing wrong. Chief Hilton rebuked the minister for want-ing such a man free. He was released however, after putting up \$50 bonds. He is unmarried and is 31 years old.
