THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

New York Must Clean Up \$10,000,000 Merrye Deficit-LocalConditions Improving-Holiday Rush.

In the local commercial world, the week has witnessed the usual restval of trade incident to the approach of the Christmas holidays. The financial situation is but little changed since hart week. While some progress is being made toward recovery from the effects of the panic, it must be admitted that it is quite slow. Everything seems to be hinging on the ability of New York to resume cash payments, Whilst they have been able to reduce their deficit of reserve to something less than \$40,000,000 from a maximum of over \$50,000,000, yet \$40,000,000 is quite a sum for even New York to vercome. The eastern and western banks seem now to be blaming each other for the slowness of cah resump-The western banks blame New York for not keeping a larger reserve, and the New York banks point out that for seven weeks ending Nov. 23. they had shipped to the western and interior banks the sum of \$135,286,-600, which, if they had kept, their deficit in reserve would more than have been wiped out. one very gratifying fact is shown from the U. Wholesale clothiers are reported having more outstanding bills than before in a de-cade, with no means of forcing collec-tions without further complicating an already weak market.


GOOD SHOE TRADE.

CAUSES GREAT SENSATION

Esmerelda Co. Officials Says Best Interests of State Require Soldiers to Remain.

Washington, Dec. 20.-President Roosevelt today directed the withdrawal of United States troops stationed at Goldfield, Nevada, on Monday, Dec. 20, next.

Telegrams on which the decision to withdraw the troops is based were given out at the White House today. The first under date of Dec. 17, directed to Gov. Sparks of Nevada, and signed by the president, reads:

PRESIDENT TO GOVERNOR. "I send troops at your request be-

cause from the tenor of your telegram and from the representations made me by the two senators from Nevada and the member of the lower house of Congress from Nevada. It appears that an insurrection was imminent, against which the state authorities would be powerless. The troops have now been which the state authorities would be powerless. The troops have now been in Goldfield 10 days and no insurrection has occurred, and seemingly no circum-stance exists to justify your calling on me for action by the troops under the provision of the Constitution. The troops were sent to Goldfield to be ready to meet a grave emergency which seemed likely to at once arise, and not to provide a substitute for the exercise by the state of its police func-tions. I don't feet at liberty to leave them indefinitely under, such circum-stances that they will in effect be per-forming on the part of the United States those ordinary duties of main-taining public order in the state of Ne-vada, which rests upon the government of the state. As the legisleture of Nevada has not been converted I am bound to assume that the power al-Nevada has not been convened I am bound to assume that the powers al-ready vested in the police officers of the state are adequate, and that if they choose to they can maintain order themselves. Under these circum-stances, unless there be forthwith fur-ther cause shown to justify keeping the troops at Goldfield, I shall direct that they shall return to their former station.



"The mine operators will at once or-ganize for protection," he said. "We have now here 150 men whom we are have now here 150 men whom we are morally bound to give protection to and we have ourselves and our property. We shall take every precautionary measure possible and shall lose no time in doing so. We fear personal violence and riot when the protection of the troops is withdrawn." Constable Inmann, who now has a large force of deputies, many of whom are in the employ of the Ming Owners' association as guards, states that he will at once make out several hundred blank commissions, and that he will in-crease his force greatly and as fast as

Sheriff Ingalis declares that he sees no cause for alarm in the order for the removal of the troops and that he shall use his best endeavor to pre-serve peace and order in the camp.

Notwithstanding all these assurances, the people of Goldfield are tonight greatly apprehensive that trouble will come when the troops shall have de-parted, and there will be great pressure brought to bear upon the president to countermand his order in so far as at least a portion of the federal troops now here is concerned. A statement new here is concerned. A statement issued by the Mine Owners' associa-tion after the session of the executive committee says that the absence of troops from Goldfield will in no way affect the position taken by the asso-ciation.

"If we are unlawfully interfered "If we are unlawfully interfered with it is the duty of the state of Ne-vada to give us protection, and if the state is unable to do so, then it is the duty of the United States. We will employ guards and discharge, as far as possible, the duties that really belong to the state and nation. "If we fail, and our property is de-stroyed, and the lives of some of our employes, or some of our members are forfielted as a consequence, the blame cannot be laid at our door," concludes the statement.

HARDWARE TRADE GOOD. The hardware trade reports every-thing going along swimmingly, except in mining inachinery and supplies, in which very little is doing on account of the stringency of the times. There is a great deal of buying along Christ-mas lines, as in sleds and skates—the demand for which has been started up by the advent of winter weather. Sleigh bells were in demand yesterday and today. Useful articles in kitchen and other household wares are going well, the prevailing moderate, if not low prices accelerating the outward move-ment from the store cases. The trade of thulders' hardware, which shows something is doing in the building line. Many stores and heaters also are find-ing ready sale.

NO REDUCTIONS.

In the wholesale dry goods trade reports a wrong impression is prevalent in the supposition that reductions are likely to occur before long in most of the lines. In either case, it means reduc-tion of wages; and if the mill help wish to strike, it will please the man-ufacturers to see them take a respits from toil. Jobbers report that spring orders are standing without any seri-ous change through cancellations. The staple lines in woolens were ordered early in the season in large quantities and as prices not beyond the cost of yarms and the production of the finish-ed cloths. Chiffon weight cloths are reported in stronger request than at this time last year, which has brought considerable business to the importers. VIOLENCE NOT LIKELY.

President McKinnon and other offi-cials of the miners' union said tonight that the possibility of disorder or violence of any sort will be no greater after the removal of the troops than now, and that they will use every endeavor to maintain peace and quiet. Atty, O. N. Hilton, sent here by President Moyer of the Western Fede-ration to assist in effecting if pos-sible, a compromise for the Western Federation of Miners with the Mine Owners' association, after a conference with President McKinnon, said that he was assured that no violence would be attempted. He said also that the position of the miners of the Western Federation is unchanged. Capt. Cox, who represents Gov.
