THE FINANCIAL SITUATION.

New York Must Clean Up \$40,000,000 Reserve Deficit—Local Conditions Improving—Holiday Rush.

While some progress is being made toward recovery from the effects of the panic, it must be admitted that it is quite slow.

CONDITION OF UTAH BANKS.

Washingt. D. C. Dec. 20—According to reports made by the comptroller of the currency, the national banks of Utah make the following showing, up to and including Dec. 1, 1907:
Banks outside of Salt Lake City, loans and discounts, \$4,574,692; lawful reserves in banks, \$545,867; individual deposits, \$5,097,764; percentage of legal reserve to deposits, 15.54.
Salt Lake City banks: Loans and discounts, \$7,984,572; lawful reserves in banks, \$1,763,548; individual deposits, \$8,010,509; percentage of reserves to deposits, 21.

PRESIDENT ORDERS TROOPS WITHDRAWN
Telegraphs Gov. Sparks Their Presence in Goldfield is Not Warranted.

CAUSES GREAT SENSATION.

Esmeralda Co. Officials Says Best Interests of State Require Soldiers to Remain.

Washington, Dec. 20.—President Roosevelt today directed the withdrawal of United States troops stationed at Goldfield, Nevada, on Monday, Dec. 20, next.

Telegrams on which the decision to withdraw the troops is based were given out at the White House today. The first under date of Dec. 17, directed to Gov. Sparks of Nevada, and signed by the president, reads:

"I send troops at your request because from the tenor of your telegram and from the representations made me by the two senators from Nevada and the members of the Mine Owners' Congress from Nevada, it appears that an insurrection was imminent, against which the state authorities would be powerless. The troops have now been in Goldfield 10 days and no insurrection has occurred, and seemingly no circumstance exists to justify your calling on me for action by the troops under the provision of the Constitution. The troops were sent to Goldfield to be ready to meet a grave emergency which seemed likely to at once arise, and not to provide a substitute for the militia by the state of Nevada.

THEODORE ROOSEVELT.

The following telegram was sent to Gov. Sparks today by the president: "I have received no answer from you to my telegram of Dec. 17, in which I said that unless there was forthwith further cause shown to justify keeping the troops at Goldfield I should direct their return to their proper stations. I am informed by the three representatives of the department of commerce and labor who are in Goldfield by my order that you have stated to them that no effort is being made by the government of Nevada to take the steps necessary in the matter. I stand ready to see that the national government does its constitutional duty in this matter of preserving order; but this readiness on the part of the national government does not excuse the state government for failure to perform its full duty in this matter. Federal aid should not be sought for by the state as a method of relieving itself from this duty, and the state should not be permitted to neglect its duty to the national government in the ordinary duties of maintaining order within the state. For the reasons given in this and my former telegrams to you, I hereby directed the troops to return to their former station on Monday, Dec. 20, next.

SENATION IN GOLDFIELD.

Goldfield, Nev., Dec. 20.—News of the president's order removing the federal troops from Goldfield on Dec. 20 has caused a sensation among the mine owners and citizens of Goldfield in general. The news was received at noon today, and during the afternoon conferences were held between Capt. Cox, the representative of Gov. Sparks, and the president, and Col. Reynolds, commanding the troops here, and between the mine owners and members of President Roosevelt's commission.

VIOLENCE NOT LIKELY.

President McKinley and other officials of the miners' union said tonight that the possibility of disorder or violence of any sort will be no greater after the removal of the troops than now, and that they will use every endeavor to maintain peace and quiet. Atty. O. N. Hilton, sent here by President Roosevelt to assist in effecting a compromise, a compromise for the Western Federation of Miners with the Mine Owners' association, after a conference with President McKinley, said tonight he was assured that no violence would be attempted. He said also that the position of the miners of the Western Federation is unchanged. Capt. Cox, who represents Gov. Sparks in Goldfield, said that the governor will at once issue instructions to Sheriff Ingalls of this county to the effect that he shall exact the sheriff to adopt rigorous measures to insure the safety and peace of every resident of Esmeralda county, and that he will be prepared at first sign of trouble to declare martial law.

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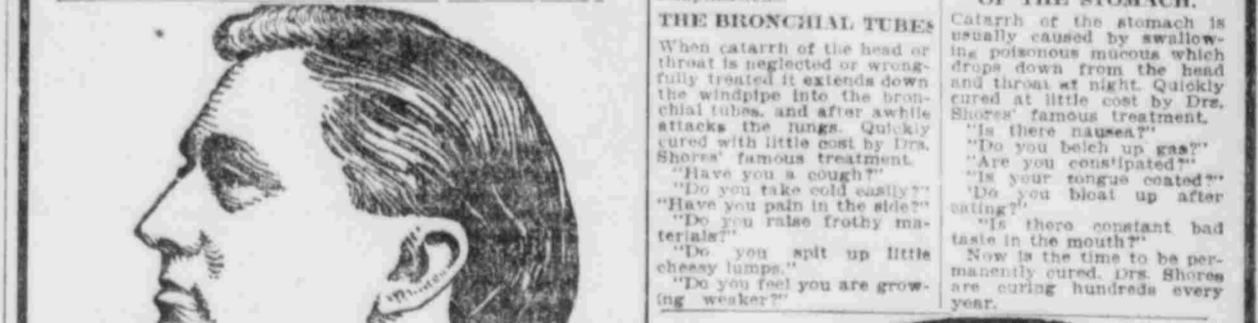
