IMPORTANT RULING IN DIVORCE CASES

Judge Howell Says He Will Not
Separate Couples on Flimsy
Pretexts.

DENTISTS IN CONVENTION.

Many Interesting Papers Discussed—
Deputy Sheriff Monahan Buried
In Ogden.

Ogden, June 23.—Judge J. A. Howell of the Second district court has decided not to grant divorces to couples who just have a little family tilt and agree to separate. This was clearly shown yesterday afternoon when the divorce suit of Mrs. Blanch Knott against Bernard Knott came up for hearing. The suit was only filed a couple of weeks ago by Mrs. Knott, and because of the prominence of the parties to the suit, it caused quite a sensation. Mrs. Knott and two other witnesses were placed on the witness stand to testify to the unhappy marriage relations. Their principal testimony was concerning a quarrel which the couple had about a month ago at the Ogden canyon, which waxed to such a fury that Mrs. Knott refused to accompany her husband home. Other little family jars were testified to, but to the court the evidence did not appear sufficient to grant a divorce, so he took a hand in the questioning of the witnesses, and among the questions put, asked her if she had not gone out in the company of other gentlemen, which she denied, excepting when her husband was along. The court was not satisfied with the evidence and continued the further hearing of the case, and said, "It may as well be understood for once and all that the court will not grant a divorce merely because there happened to be a quarrel between two parties who have been married for several years."

The divorce suit of Nellie Brown against Wallace Brown also came up for trial, and the court entered the same ruling in that case, holding that the evidence was insufficient on which to grant a divorce.

State Association Meets to Exchange
Experiences and Discuss Methods.

Ogden, June 23.—The Utah State Dental association is holding a two-days' convention at the Reed hotel in this city. The attendance at the meetings is unusually good and much interest is being manifested in the various subjects discussed. The visitors were welcomed in behalf of the citizens of Ogden by Dr. E. M. Conroy, mayor of the city and Dr. P. N. Smith, of Ogden, president of the association responded in behalf of the dentists.

The report of the various committees were read showing the association to be strong and progressive. Dr. E. L. Townsend, of Los Angeles, read a most interesting paper on "The Making of Gum Sections, using Plain Teeth," which opened up a discussion that lasted for over an hour.

An unusually instructive paper by Dr. Wesley Davis of Salt Lake City on "Preservation of Pulp," was given by Dr. Wesley of Salt Lake City, which was considered at length by Dr. H. P. Burles of Logan, and others in debating on the subject.

Dr. Eugene Talbot of Chicago took as his subject "Interstitial Gingivitis, due to Auto-intoxication," relating considerable of his experience in treating the teeth. Others followed in the discussion.

BURIAL OF SHERIFF MONAHAN.

The body of John J. Wednesday noon all the stores and butcher shops here closed to join the Salt Lake association in their outing at Saltair.

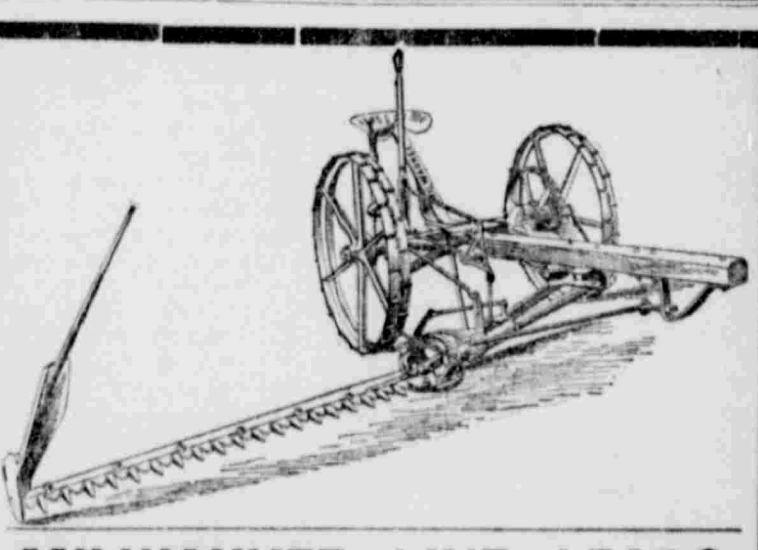

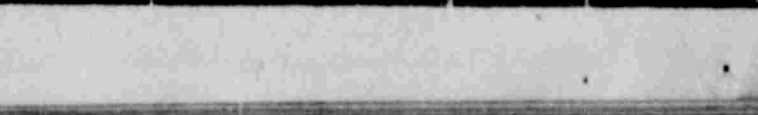
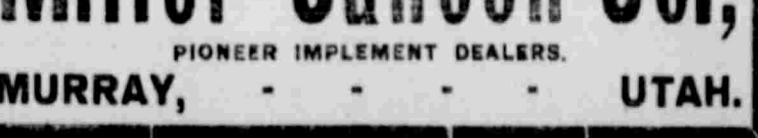

NEW WATER CAR FOR MINES.

The new device shown in the picture is designed to minimize the danger of explosions from dust in mines. It consists of a steel tank of a capacity of 200 gallons mounted on a truck. Inside the tank and out of the way is a horizontal force pump so arranged that it may be worked from the outside. The spray nozzle will throw a stream from thirty to forty feet.
