The appli-cant argued that the writ should be granted on the grounds that the justice of the peace of Morgan county, before whom Schwartzfoger had preliminary hearing had no jurisdiction in the case because defendant is but 17 years of age, therefore the attorney argued the only legal act the justice could have taken would have been to remand him to the district judge, who should hear the case slitting as a juvenile court judge, and therefore the sheriff of Mor-gan county has no right to hold Swartzfager or his bondsmen for his appearance, and that if he should fail to appear for trial the \$5,600 bond could not be collected.
