

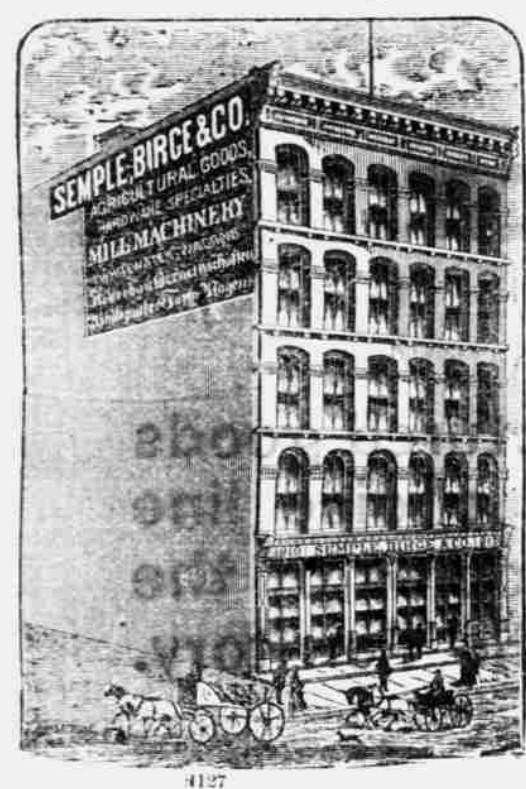

SENATE.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 7.—Hitch-
cock called up the Senate bill to in-
crease the salary of the Secretary of War
for the sale of the land in Nebraska;
Kearney, military reservation in
Nebraska, passed.Morrill, of Maine, said a confer-
ence committee had come to mean
the House of Representatives, and
only one. On such ground the
conference was impracticable, be-
cause there could be but one

which lay behind the action of
the House of Representatives
covered the whole field of
legislation, and it was the
Senate of the United States. It
had been claimed that the House
had reduced the appropriation,
as compared with the bill of last
year, \$2,000,000, but the House
