GOOD COPPER QUARTZ,

Found on Clearwater River - Assays as High as \$135 a Ton.

Some excellent speciments of copper quartz were displayed last evening in the Raymond house office, says the Lewiston Tribune. The specimens were from discoveries recently made in the Clearwater river about fifteen miles above Orofino. A group of claims have been located there by C. P. 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
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
