CHICAGO, 19.—The national mass meeting of the wool growers of the United States was called to order at 10 o'clock this morning, 134 delegates being present, 50 of whom were from Ohio, 38 from Pennsylvania. Twenty-one States and Territories are represented. J. S. Coddington, of Kansas, was elected temporary chairman. The committee on permanent organization was appointed. Recess.

WASHINGTON, D. C., 19.—The Fifth annual meeting of the League of American Wheelmen commenced its session this morning. Unusual interest attaches to the meeting on account of the reported intention of some dissatisfied ones to move a dissolution of the league. It is stated that from 1,500 to 1,700 bicyclists will take part in the parade to-morrow.

FOREIGN.

LONDON, 17.—It is reported the Malagasy government offers France a million pounds to renounce all claims to her territory in Madagascar.

Lord St. Leonards, arrested on a charge of assaulting a maid servant at his house, demanded a trial by his peers.

The dynamiter, Dennis Deady, died in Chatham prison.

Liverpool, 17.—A fire in three cotton warehouses to-day was extinguished. In one, the property of Molyneux & Taylor, the damage is estimated at £100,000. Three thousand bales of cotton were destroyed.

LONDON, 18.—Final negotiations in regard to the Egyptian conference have been concluded. France and Italy persistently insist upon their rights to discuss the general question of the administration of Egypt.

MADRID, 18.—Court martial at Saragossa for the trial of 14 officers charged with desertion, sentenced one major to imprisonment for life; a lieutenant was sentenced to imprisonment for 20 years, others 12 years.

BERLIN, 18.—A convention of 500 delegates of the national liberal party was held here to-day. The convention unanimously passed resolutions expressing unswerving loyalty to the Emperor and the empire and declaring its conviction of the necessity of the anti-social law and resolved to maintain unimpaired the constitutional rights of the people's representatives.

LONDON, 19.—Mr. Sam. Ward died at Pegli, Italy, to-day. He passed away peacefully surrounded by loving friends.

CONSTANTINOPLE, 19.—At Bei Bazar, a city in Asia Minor, 950 dwellings, 544 warehouses and shops, 11 mosques, 15 schools, 9 Khans and 146 other buildings were destroyed by fire. Eleven persons perished.

SMITH'S MOTOR.

HOW AN INGENIOUS HOME INVENTION IS WORKING.

Our readers will remember some time ago an article appearing in this paper relative to a water motor invented by Brother Job Smith, of Brigham City, Box Elder County, with the representation made by Mr. L. K. Adams, of the Idaho Mining and Development Company, concerning it. We have received from Brother Smith a note, enclosing another from Mr. Adams, whereby it is evident that our fellow laborer's invention is a practical success. Brother Smith says:

It will be remembered that a stream of water had to be lifted 25 feet high, and it now being three to four inches deep, running rapidly through an inclined flume two feet wide, the practical result is even better than I had hoped for.

For the success achieved I am profoundly thankful to God, and not forgetful of obligations for the assistance and encouragement I have received from friends.

Following is a copy of Mr. Adam's letter to the inventor:

LITTLE RAPIDS, MINIDOKO P. O. Idaho, May 11th 1884.

Job Smith, Esq:

Dear Sir, yours received; would say in reply that the wheel is doing all we expected. The river has risen nine inches at the wheel, and two feet at the foot of the rapids. It gives three to four inches in depth in the flume, which is

two feet wide. Every one who sees the operation is much pleased with it. Still there are imperfections that can be remedied, such as iron paddle-bolts instead of pins, oak instead of pine battens on paddles, iron lugs instead of oak; although the oak ones do well. The eighteen inch drivers are not large enough for the twelve inch paddles; they are cut so deep that they strike the hub and set-screws which should not be; but all these imperfections are easily remedied. I think it is in time bound to revolutionize this valley, and make it "blossom as the rose." Respectfully Yours,
