THE PATRONS OF HUS. BANDRY.

THE Order has a charitable feature. Members are commanded to feed the hungry, help the fatherless and the widows, and to visit any brothere or sisters who are sick and see that they are provided with all things needful. The constitution provides that any member found guilty of wanton cruelty to animals shall be expelled from the Order. Applications for dispensations must be made to the secretary of the Na-tional Grange, and be signed by the persons applying for the same, and be accompanied by a fee of fifteen dollars. Fifteen subordinate granges working in a State can apply for authority to organize a State grange. The treasurer of all granges must give bonds to be approved by the officers of their respective granges. In all granges bills must be approved by the master and countersigned by the secretary, before the treasurer can pay the same. Religious or political questions are not tolerated as subjects of discussion in the work of the Order, and no political or religious tests for membership can be applied. Of the dispensation fee (\$15) \$6 is at once returned by the Secretary of the National Grange in the form of
