WASHINGTON, 12.—Howe devoted a large portion of his speech to a criticism of Schurz's speech of yesterday, and declared that it was a "damnable" and "disgraceful" attack upon the republican party. He defended the republican party against the charges of sectionalism, and enlarged upon the condition of Louisiana, and said that the republican party had no objection to the admission of Louisiana into the Union, but that it was the duty of the government to protect the rights of the people of Louisiana, and to prevent the establishment of a military government in that State.

SPRINGFIELD, Mass., 12.—Chas. A. Stephens, the defeated candidate in the November election, was today nominated for Congress to fill the vacancy caused by the death of Alvin Crocker.

Laid on the Table.

ALBANY, N. Y., 12.—The resolutions introduced in the Senate to-day, condemning the military interference in Louisiana, were laid on the table to await the report of the Congressional committee.

In Charge of Detectives.

PHILADELPHIA, 12.—A Westchester, Pa. dispatch says that the government paper mills near that place, were, on Saturday last, placed under the charge of government detectives, and that a force of deputy clerks from the Treasury Department at Washington have arrived, and will proceed to take account of the stocks, exactly what is the trouble is unknown, but it is thought there are suspicions that some of the stocks are stolen for the purpose of counterfeiters.

Dead.

LOUISVILLE, Ky., 12.—Ex-Gov. Thomas E. Bramlette died at his residence here this afternoon, after a long illness, of pneumonia and rheumatism of the heart.

Insured.

ST. LOUIS, 12.—Governor Harding was inaugurated at Jefferson today. The inaugural message was devoted wholly to State matters, except a reference to the Louisiana troubles, in which he protests against the unconstitutional employment of U. S. military forces as a precedent dangerous to American liberties.

Pinchback Re-elected.

NEW ORLEANS, 12.—The Kellogg legislature, to-day, adopted a resolution to go immediately into the senate to elect a re-elected Pinchback; the movement was so sudden that Pinchback's opponents seemed unable to rally. Pinchback was placed in nomination in each house, and the vote resulted, in the senate 15 to 5, in the house 45 to 7. A joint session will be held on the 15th, to elect a new legislature.

More Testimony.

VICKSBURG, 12.—Before the congressional committee to-day, Crosby, in his cross examination, admitted that he had testified that Governor Ames had been in the power of the county to regain his office. A number of telegrams that passed between the governor and his officials were produced and read; also one from Adjutant General Facker, by order of Governor Ames, to Captain Hall, commanding a colored company to co-operate with his company with sheriff Crosby in his office, and to suppress a riotous mob in Vicksburg. The captain of one of the colored companies engaged by the state testified that Robert Bangs, whose mother testified that he was shot in the house by whites, was in his company; witness belonged to a colored club.
