Validity Affirmed by Judge of English

Hight Court of Justice.

Hight Court of Justice. London, Feb. 21.—The validity of a Dakota divorce in England was today affirmed by Sir John Gorrell Barnes, Judge of the divorce court division of the high court of justice. The questions were raised in the case of Mrs. Armit-age, who petitioned the court to declare her marriage to Armitage valid. She formerly was the wife of Charles Gillig. an American, living in London and North and South Dakota, where she obtained a divorce upon the ground of desertion and subsequently married Mr. Armitage. Mr. Gillig also remarried, but last year began proceedings to nul-lify his marriage upon the ground that the divorce which his first wife obtained in South Dakota was not binding upon in South Dakota was not binding upon him and that consequently his second marriage was invalid. Justice Barnes decided against Mr. Gillig's contention.
