 Washington's birthday to-morrow.

Utah & Northern got into Ogden at 3 o'clock this morning. Snow is three feet on the level in a large portion of Cache Valley. The complimentary benefit to Mr. Staley has been postponed till next week. We have received from the publishers, No. 2 of "Deseret Home," a home publication. Hon. W. B. Preston, who has been ill for several days, is feeling better today. Mrs. Preston is in Ogden. There is said to be five feet of snow on the level at Alta. Now will some one please tell us where the level is? To-night the grand ball and carnival under the auspices of the Hebrew Benevolent Societies, for the benefit of the Hebrew school fund, comes off at the Theatre. In point of duration, the cold weather this winter has had few parallels in any previous season. It will hold out, notwithstanding we are now the latter half of February. We have seen a letter from Elder Joseph W. McMurrin, now laboring in Kyrie, Scotland, in which he expresses his pleasure in laboring for the advancement of the work of God. To-morrow being the anniversary of the birthday of the great Washington, all the attaches of this office will take a holiday in honor of the occasion. The News will not issue again till Thursday. A Kansas City paper says the air is balmy and the blue birds have arrived. The air is not very balmy here, and we have no blue birds yet, but the blue birds are abundant. The jury in the case of Joseph Hildreth returned a verdict of guilty as charged, in the first degree, between seven and eight o'clock last night. It was accompanied by a recommendation to the mercy of the court. Yesterday Louis Reggel was arrested on a requisition from Pennsylvania. He lately went into bankruptcy and the charge is for obtaining goods on false pretenses. Samuel Scherwin and Simon Wilson are the complainants. A heavy snow storm commenced yesterday morning and continued all day. The fall extends over the northern and western portions of Nebraska and west to Ogden, and north to Idaho. So far as regards Utah, there is a slight drifting west. Before dipping a new pen into ink, thrust it into a fresh-cut potato, and the ink will never clog. When the pen is thickly gummed with dried ink, a few thrusts will clean it perfectly. When not in use, some accountants leave their pens sticking into a potato kept on the desk for the purpose. The Ogden Herald says: The C. & P. express train, the forenoon 9:30, was two hours late. The cause was delay in being given to it as an encounter with a number of cowboys on the track west of "Ironmont." The driver of cattle was run into by the engine, and four of the animals were killed. One quadruped was carried on the pile, as deadhead passenger, for some distance. The passengers were not aware of the cattle catastrophe till some time after its occurrence.

Under its cover numerous robberies were perpetrated. The fog was being seized upon by the thieves as a robe for their personal valuables. Wants to Know.—Ellen Holmes, 27 Mount St., New Leeds, Bradford, Yorkshire, England, would like to know the whereabouts of her brother, Wardman Holmes, who emigrated to Utah 28 years ago. If any person can give any information of him to the above address it would be thankfully received. The Forthcoming Charter.—At the meeting of the City Council held last evening all that portion of the proposed new charter for the city which previously considered was passed upon with the exception of the last section, action upon which was deferred until the regular meeting this evening. We are pleased to observe the care and attention that is being devoted by the City Fathers to this very important matter. Thorough digestion is a necessary prelude to assimilation. A Curious Incident.—The Park City Record tells the following rather remarkable incident: "On Monday Mr. Jacob Lundberg, of Kansas, called at this office and related the following curious circumstance. On going into his corral that morning he noticed the peculiar action of one of his most valuable cows, which was shaking her head and bleeding quite freely at the mouth. Upon examination it was ascertained that about one half the tongue was bitten off and missing, but was found near by after some search. Mr. B. was at a loss to know how this happened. Finally it occurred to him that one of his horses might know something about it. In the same yard was a partition with the ordinary space between, where he had been accustomed to throw the hay when feeding his stock. Putting some hay on the side where he hit the horse he waited to see what the result might be. Presently the cows came up and reached through the fence after a mouthful of hay, when the horse would snap for their tongues. This the cow lost her tongue, it being cut off by the horse during a similar operation. The cow was a valuable one, but of course had to be killed as she could eat nothing what-soever."

Washington's Views.—To-morrow being the anniversary of the birthday of the immortal Washington, it is proper to observe that the spirit of that great man permitted to gaze upon the condition of this nation he would doubtless be filled with ineffable contempt in viewing the intolerant movement now on foot against the Latter-day Saints. How different is the genius of the anti-Mormon movement from the spirit breathed by the following letter, written by him, soon after the framing of the Constitution, and directed to the Central Committee of the United Baptist Churches in Virginia: "Gentlemen:—If I could have entertained the slightest apprehension that the Constitution framed by the Convention where I had the honor to preside, might possibly endanger the religious rights of any ecclesiastical society, certainly I would have never placed my signature to it; and if I could conceive that the General Government might ever be so administered as to render the liberty of conscience insecure, I beg you will be persuaded, that no one would be more zealous than myself to establish effectual barriers against the horrors of spiritual tyranny and every species of religious persecution. For you doubtless remember I have often expressed my sentiments, that any man conducting himself as a good citizen, and being accountable to God alone for religious opinions, ought to be protected in worshipping the Deity according to the dictates of his own conscience." There is an attempt to administer the general government in such a way as to render the liberty of conscience insecure, and the constitutional barriers erected by General Washington and his fellow patriots who were the founders of the great Republic, are being battered and broken by the enemies of freedom. Not only has a law been passed for the restriction of the free exercise of religion, but a measure of monstrous tyranny has now been put upon its passage through the National Legislature intended to establish a species of despotism that would put some of the effete monarchies of the old world to the blush, reducing the people who have built up the great interior west to the position of political slaves. Even if the infamous plot to enslave the Latter-day Saints should become law by the passage of the Edmunds bill through the House and its endorsement by the Chief Magistrate, the condition it aims to introduce is impracticable. The Anglo-Saxon race acquainted with the sweets of freedom can never be reduced to the abject condition of serfdom. At least they will never remain in that attitude, and a braver or a better people than the overwhelming majority of the community of Utah are not anywhere to be found, yet their courage is tempered with the spirit of peace. Swiss and German Mission.—We make the following extract from a letter from Elder John Alder, President of the Swiss and German Mission, published in the *Millennial Star* of Jan. 30th: "During the past year, the labors of the Elders in this Mission have been attended with satisfactory results—227 souls being added to our numbers during the last six months—423 of this number have been baptized in Germany, and 101 persons to Switzerland. There is much inquiry after the Gospel manifested among the population of Germany, but the authorities of the land are against us, and try to hinder the preaching and spreading of the Gospel of Christ, and in consequence of this, the Elders laboring there have to be very prudent, and do most of their work in freethinking teaching. Elder A. H. Cannon is now laboring in North Germany, including in his District the Banners of the Church existing in Berlin, Halberstadt and Nurnberg, and he has also visited Hamburg, Kiel and Bremen. His labors have been attended with much success, many receiving the Gospel through his instrumentalities, and through his teachings and exhortations the Saints of that district have become more united and true to their duties than they had been. He reports the inquiry after the Gospel on the increase in his field of labor. Elders C. C. Schramm and C. Schmittler are working faithfully in the South German Conference, which embraces Wurtemberg, southern Bavaria and Baden. They have had much success in their labors, and the God of Israel was ever with them, and their labors have not been in vain. Although they are not permitted to hold public meetings, yet the Saints and people seeking the truth meet in small numbers in Stuttgart, the capital of Wurtemberg, and in Ludwigsburg, in Rhenish-Bavaria, and thus our brethren reach the principles of life and salvation to many who, after hearing, become convinced of the truth of their words and obey the same. With faithful, prudent Elders, much good can be accomplished in this field yet. Elders U. Stauffer and John Hasler are laboring in the Swiss Conference. Elder F. G. Goss is assigned to the Bern Conference, and Elder James Beus has charge of the Jura Conference. All these brethren report good prospects for the spread of the Gospel in their districts. Elder Beus will very likely pay his relatives in Italy another visit to-morrow spring, and has prospects of emigrating several persons from there. Elder J. C. Walker is faithful in his labors in the office. The health of all the brethren from Utah, and also of the Saints in general, is good. Misinformed.—Senator Lapham wishes the statute sustaining polygamy in Utah repealed. As there is no such law in existence the gentleman appears to be doing a work of supererogation. A little information would probably not hurt Senator Lapham much. One of these days there will be a fearful flustering of those who are trying to have their names hoisted on the Utah Hobby. The Right of Petition.—Petitions to Congress against threatened restrictive legislation are being circulated throughout the Territory and receiving an immense number of signatures. There are three distinct documents, one for the names of citizens generally, another, those of the young men, and a third, those of the young ladies of the community. Fixed and Bound.—Yesterday, at Draper, Miller Daniels was arrested for threatening personal violence and to take the life of J. P. Johnson. The accused was tried before Justice Fitzgerald, fined \$25, and put under bonds to keep the peace for three months.

Will Close.—We understand that the anniversary of Washington's birthday will be generally observed as a holiday in this city. How He Sees It.—W. J. Farr, a Baptist of Augusta, Georgia, writes to Dr. Murphy, of this city, about the present crusade against the anti-Mormons: "The Lord is on your side. He may permit your people to be annoyed and perplexed for some time, but it will do more good than harm in the end. If the bigots go for you too hard I feel as if I would like to come out and help you."

A Profitable Meeting.—There was a very interesting meeting in the 12th Ward School-house last night. The Young Ladies' and Young Men's Mutual Improvement associations of the 2nd, 6th, 11th and 12th Wards assembled conjointly, S. Clawson presiding. The programme included four exercises each from the several associations, which were rendered in such a way as to make them highly acceptable to the large audience, which filled the house. President Joseph H. Felt, of the Stake organization, was present and made appropriate remarks.

Died at St. George.—Brother J. W. Nixon, an old citizen of Utah, died at St. George, at an early hour yesterday morning. The news came by private telegram to President W. Woodruff. The deceased was a good man, highly esteemed in the community. A few months since he underwent an operation in this city for the removal of some tumors, which subsequently re-formed, and in all probability were the cause of his death. The surgeon who performed the operation did not at the time anticipate a permanent recovery.

Legislature.—At the Council, this afternoon, the committee on roads, bridges, etc., reported favorably on the petition for a wagon road from Paradise, Cache County, to Brigham City, Box Elder County, appropriating \$1,000 therefor, if Cache County would appropriate \$500 also. Councilors E. Snow, D. H. Wells and J. T. Caine were appointed the joint committee on memorial to act with the committee from the House. The House bill in relation to salaries of probate judges was rejected. The resolution of Councilor Wells calling for a constitutional convention was read; ordered printed.

A Manly Man.—We observe by an eastern paper that the anti-Mormon movement met, with a noble objector in Cincinnati, in the person of the Rev. Dr. Morris, the President of Lane Theological Seminary. At a meeting of the Presbyterian Ministerial Association, held for the consideration of the subject of having "Mormonism" blotted out, a paper written by him was read, in which he deprecated any intended resort by Government to despotic means. He visited Utah last summer, and was therefore able to speak advisedly. The balance of the meeting was, however, sharply against him, notwithstanding he was probably the only well-informed man on the subject present. The stand of Dr. Morris was a noble one, in the interest of human rights and in the interest of morality, virtue and honesty, and second to no other on the continent. Instead of following the wholesome advice of Dr. Morris, the sectarian exponents followed the dictates of the "doctrine of hate."
