LOCAL BRIEFS.

The Electrical Workers spent nine hours yesterday discussing the relations of the installers and inside men of the Bell Telephone company with the company, and decided to take no action until the national officials had conferred with.

Plans are being drawn for the enlargement of the west annex of the Walker Bros. Mercantile block to the same size as the remainder of the building, making the entire structure 165 feet square. The improvement will be made early in the year.

Judge C. W. Morse left yesterday for Sevier county to try a case in which the rights to the waters of Sevier river are involved. It is expected that the trial of the case will last more than a month. The case of James Young against Daniel Lunn et al, which involves the rights to the waters of Mill Creek, has been continued by Judge Morse until he returns from Sevier county.

Articles of incorporation of the Shepherd Steam Turbine company have been filed with the secretary of state and county clerk. The capital stock of the company is \$100,000, divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. Frank D. Shepherd is president; C. M. Chandler, vice president; B. Jack, secretary and treasurer. The company will manufacture steam turbines, a patent for which has been secured by Mr. Shepherd.

At the meeting of the Salt Lake County Horticultural society on Saturday afternoon the principal speaker was Mr. S. March, a well known Michigan fruit grower. He spoke particularly of peach-raising in Michigan and gave some interesting information concerning the best methods of guarding against pests and diseases of peach trees. Mr. March also told of his great success with strawberries and stated that he had raised 400 bushels of berries on an acre of ground.

There will be civil service examinations in this city Dec. 27 next for the position of assistant cook. A. Abbot, N. M., at \$450 per annum; also Jan. 3, for position of Teacher of Agriculture at Chillico school, Okla., at \$1,500 per annum; also for the position of expert freight clerk in the quartermaster's department at large, at Washington, at \$1,200 per annum; also for position of lithographer, at the department of Agriculture, at Washington, at \$720 per annum.

Oscar F. Lyons of Peoa, who is charged in the federal court with padding his cancellations of stamps, which employed as restaurant cook at Peoa, has pleaded not guilty and will remain under bonds until the case can be tried. The specific action on which the arrest of Lyons was based was his sending of \$15 in stamps to a Salt Lake firm where he owed an obligation, and then the apparent discovery by inspectors that the cancellations having been "added" to make a balance on the books.

A copy of the articles of incorporation of the Cactus Club of Newhouse, Beaver county, has been filed in the secretary of state's office. The purpose of the club is to promote the social welfare of its members. The managing directors of the club are R. J. Graham, A. D. Moffat, J. C. Boyd, C. W. Alvord, Victor Carlson, George Algood and Jack Hosmer. The club was formed by employees of the Newhouse company, but all residents of the town are eligible to membership upon the payment of certain initiation fees and dues.

Ex-United States Senator Thomas Kearns has received notice from the pension department at Washington that a pension has been granted to Edith Dexter Le Compté of Park City. Le Compté was injured in the gymnasium at West Point while a cadet from Utah, receiving a fractured knee while mounting a wooden horse during drill. He was discharged for physical inability to continue his work after a time in the hospital. While in the senate, Hon. Thomas Kearns introduced a bill asking for a pension of \$17 per month for Le Compté and payments will now begin.

DEPUTY SHERIFFS MAKE GOOD CATCH

Six Men Supposed to be Connected With Recent Robberies Arrested Near Murray.

EVIDENCE OF THEIR GUILT.

One Shot by His Companions Who Charged Him With Having "Peached."

By the arrest of six men in "Berger-town," near Murray, yesterday by several deputy sheriffs, and the marshal at Murray, it is believed that the men who committed two burglaries and a robbery in that vicinity recently have been apprehended. Several nights ago a Cushing Bros. store at Sandy and a large amount of merchandise was stolen. A lot of the stolen goods was found cached in the cabin where James Moore, the last named, was shot Saturday night and claimed that he had been held up. He was shot in the hand and in the thigh. It was thought by Marshal Mauss and his deputies at Murray that he was a member of the gang they were looking for, and that he had been shot by one of his own gang. This proved to be true, as he confessed to Marshal Mauss that some of the gang had accused him of "peaching" on the three men who were arrested last Thursday. This led to a quarrel during which the shooting occurred. Moore, when taken in charge by the officers, stated that he had been held up by yesterday he told the truth in regard to the matter.

On Thursday about 50 pairs of shoes were taken to Grecks and Austrians and a large quantity of merchandise stolen from the box car and Cushing Bros. store was found as well as a quantity of guns, saws, nitro, braces and six other cartridges. Moore, the wounded man, is being treated, and is not thought to be seriously injured.
