# MAKE GOOD CATCH

Six Men Supposed to be Connected With Recent Robberies Arrested Near Murray.

EVIDENCE OF THEIR GUILT.

One Shot by His Companions Who Charged Him With Having "Peached."

By the arrest of six men in "Bergerwn," near Murray, yesterday by several deputy sheriffs, and the marshal at Murray, it is believed that the men who committed two burglaries and a robbery in that vicinity recently have been apprehended. Several nights ago Cushing Bros.' store at Sandy and a Cushing Bros, store at Sandy and a box car at Murray were burglarized, and a large amount of merchandise was stolen. A lot of the stolen goods was found cached in the cabin where the men were captured. One of the men is also believed to be responsible for the theft of a value from Mrs. Mary Shlaids as she was parting off a Murray Shields as she was getting off a Murray

Shields as she was getting off a Murray car Friday night.

The men arrested are Frank Monroe, Thomas Maddesi, James Bradford. Thomas Shea, Frank Warren and James Moore. The last named was shot Saturday night and claimed that he had been held up. He was shot in the hand and in the thigh. It was thought by Marshal Mauss and his deputies at Murray that he was a member uties at Murray that he was a member of the gang they were looking for, and that he had been shot by one of his own gang. This proved to be true, as he confessed to Marshal Mauss that he confessed to Marshal Mauss that some of the gang had accused him of "peaching" on the three men who were arrested last Thursday. This led to a quarrel during which the shooting occurred. Moore, when taken in charge by the officers, stated that he had been held up but yesterday he told the truth in regard to the matter.

On Thrusday about 50 pairs of shoes were sold to Greeks and Austrians at 50 cents a pair by three men named J.

The shoes answered the description of those stolen from the box car, so the three men were arrested and are now charged with burglary. The hut where the men lived was not located until yesterday when was not located until yesterday when a Greek informed the officers where it was. Marshall Mauss summoned quite a posse consisting of himself and Deputes William Caldwell and Hyrum Whittle, and Deputy Sheriffs Sharp, Steele, Sleater and Booth of this city, and they raided the place. At first the men showed fight but when they the men showed fight, but when they realized who they had to deal with they came out of the hut and surren-dered. They were searched and re-lieved of their guns and ammunition, and were then handcuffed and taken to the Murray jall and later to the county jail in this city. Their hut was search-ed and a large quantity of merchan-dise stolen from the box car and Cushing Bros.' store was found as was also a quantity of guns, saws, nitro, braces and bits and cartridges. Moore, the wounded man, is being treated, and is not thought to be seriously injured.
