LOCAL BRIEFS.

Two automatic furnace stokers have just been installed in the "News" building.

Nephew Hawthorne has been appointed road supervisor of district No. 5 by the county commissioners to succeed James A. Taylor, resigned.

Adj.-Gen. Geoghegan says that his task is one of cooperation and he is addressed by that title in communications from the war department.

The Diamond Furniture Co. has now taken over the entire line of furniture for the new First Public Library building, their bid being the lowest submitted.

There is a slight falling off in the cattle shipments through the Salt Lake stockyards, but the sheep shipments continue quite heavy, being one and two train loads every day.

A wind storm struck the city just before last midnight, blowing at 30 miles per hour. It filled the streets with thick dust and made travel unpleasant, besides breaking numerous branches from the trees.

J. J. Moller has returned from Philadelphia, where he was called by the sickness of his mother. Mr. Moller will put up a building at Brigham for occupancy by his paper, *The Bulletin*, which C. T. Harris is the editor.

The walls of the confid rooms in the Federal building were recently upholstered in dark woodwork of elaborate designs, including comfortable piano work. One of the rooms will be used by the district court, and the other by the circuit court.

The building committee of the First Methodist church has calmly turned down all the bids, as the magnitude of some of them was not at all assuring. The committee proposes to have the new church edifice not cost more than the original estimate of \$60,000.

Mrs. Madeline B. Conkling, Most Worshipful Master of the Order of the Eastern Star, will visit the Salt Lake chapter tomorrow, on her arrival from Portland where she has been in attendance on the exposition. Mrs. Conkling will also visit Provo, Park City and Ogden chapters while in the state.

The five pumps at the mouth of Utah Lake are making a great draft on the waters of the lake so that the level is now one foot lower than it was a year ago. The water is used to move up the water of the lake rather than have so much of it carried off in evaporation, and the project to deepen the lake and thus make of it a better reservoir will be pushed.

Former Deputy Warden T. C. Wright of the state prison has returned from a trip to the Portland fair. He says the landscape gardening is something remarkable, and its beauty is indeed surpassing. The artificial lighting is of an elaborate order, and at night, the display is very imposing. Mr. Wright does not know the extent or diversity of the exhibition is anything great, but at the same time it is choice what there is of it.

Agent Sanford of the Pacific Express company is back from a trip to Omaha, where he says it was so cold that he suffered from rheumatism. At the same time, he came from Chicago, where it was horribly hot in the Windy City. There was a cold wave running east from the northwest through Montana and down the Missouri river valley past Omaha, which acted very much like an ocean current, which differs in temperature from the waters on either side of it.

In the Residence of Mr. M. H. Walker Where the Jonas Musicae Was Given Last Night.

There have been many rare and delightful musicals in the homes of Salt Lake people, but it is doubtful if there ever has been a rarer or more successful one than that which was given at the palatial residence of Mr. and Mrs. M. H. Walker last night. A number of more of the friends of the Walkers, including our musical neighbors, were invited to hear the noted Jones in a piano recital that proved itself a most charming event and incomparable to Salt Lake's the genius of the performer. Other artists of the evening were Prof. McMillan, Prof. Wells, Mr. Dougall and Mr. Walker himself, the latter giving a solo performance which adorns his home. The skillful manner in which he manipulated the big instrument was one of the pleasant surprises of the night and disclosed to his audience his wide charm and wonderful program.

In addition to the numbers referred to he gave "Romance" (Schubert), "Minuetto Scherzando" (Stavanhagen), and "Concert Musique," one of the prettiest pieces of the night, composed by Mr. Jones. The striking feature was the dual number on organ and piano by Messrs. McClellan and Jones, the "Pastorale" by Guilmant. Its rendition brought forth an ovation. After that Mr. McClellan gave the "Scherzo"

of the same gifted composer, and won a unanimous outburst of applause.

Mr. Walker's piano, which was the joint effort of Mr. Jones and Mr. Walker in the Sonata second and third movements by Greig. This great and difficult number was one of the distinct hits of the night, and pianist and violinist shone alike in the honors that followed.

Dougall and McMillan, the latter as accompanist and the former as harp soloist, were enthusiastically received. Mr. Dougall sang most effectively the "Spanish Fancies" and for all others gave "Autumn Leaves."

Mr. Walker gave "The Dream" which had been a success at the opening of the program.

They were the surprise from "Oberon" (Von Weber) and the "Andante" (To My Wife) by Lanner, the English organist, heard in the Tabernacle a couple of seasons ago.

During a three minute intermission the audience were served and a round of social converse indulged in. Altogether the evening was a notable one from every standpoint and was thus unanimously voted by those who had attended to be a perfect ovation.

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
