CONFERENCE OF GOVERNORS.

Gov. Johnson's Proposition for One i

Rejected by President Roosevelt

St. Paul, March 22.-Gov, Johnson today received a letter from Presiden Roosevelt in reply to the governor proposition for a conference of governor and the various state railroad questions.
