participated in the affair and also M. O. Blakesly, instructor in chemistry O. Blakesly, instructor in chemistry at the High school, from whom the boys secured a part at least of the nitrate of silver used to daub on the faces of the freshmen. The board will meet again Sunday evening to complete the learing and decide what action shall be taken looking toward the punishment of the offenders, and also whether any consure or other number. whether any censure or other punish-ment shall be bestowed on Prof. Blakes-

At the meeting on Saturday evening all the members of the board were present and notices had been sent out the night before to each person who had signed the petition asking for the inves-tigation. They were invited to be pres-ent at the hearing and to bring any others who might be interested. The boys who had acid applied to their faces were also asked to attend, likewise a number of boys accused of doing

the hazing.
Of those who signed the petition Mrs.
George J. Kelly and A. F. Parker were
the only ones who responded. Mrs.
Kelly's son, who was one of the boys
mistreated by the upper classmen, was unable to appear, owing to an inflamed eye, but his mother explained that this was not at all due to the hazing.

Both Mrs. Kelly and Mr. Parker told of the condition in which the application of nitrate of silver had left the faces of their boys. Each of these parents exonerated the upper classmen of any malicious intent, attributing their acts simply to a spirit of mischief.

Bert Parker, one of the freshmen said that a week ago Friday, at the close of his first day in the High school, he was caught by a bunch of larger boys just as he got outside the door of the High school and nitrate of silver was applied to his face, by means of cloth on the end of a stiek. He gave the names of a number of boys who assaulted him and who ap-plied the nitrate. Both sides of his face were blackened and also one his face were blackened and also one of his eyelids. Stephen Keogh, who was the worst used of any of the boys, appeared before the board, one side of his face being still very much inflamed as the result of the application of the putrate of silver and of the animonia nitrate of silver and of the ammonia which was afterward applied at a drug store in an endeavor to remove the dis coloration. Keogh had been followed down town and the sutff applied to his face near the courthouse. He also gave name. number of names of these who han-

M. O. Blakesly, the instructor in chemistry, was on the anxious seat for chemistry, was on the anxious seat for about half an hour, and was subjected to a fire of questions from various members of the board. Blakesly said he had given some nitrate of sliver to two of the boys, who had asked him for it. They had told him they wanted it for an experiment, and he had not questions from the continuous for the an experiment, and he had not ques-tioned them as to what kind of experiment they proposed making. He also said that his class had not yet studied nitrate of silver and were not prepared to experiment with it intelligently. He said some more of the stuff had been taken from the laboratory, but he did not know by whom. The door was locked and he had the key. The stuff was in a cupboard, which was also locked, and of which he had the key. He could not remember whether he had let anybody else into the laboratory or not, but said he might have let in one or two of the boys, but if so, he had no recollection of it. He was questioned very closely as to whether he knew that the boys were preparing to haze the freshmen, and that they want-ed the nitrate of silver for that pur-pose. He denied that he had any such idea. One or two members of the board flatly told Prof. Blakesly that they believed he was evading, but he protested

Charles A. Maguire and Joseph Tracy charles A. Maguire and Joseph Tracy frankly confessed that they had had a hand in the hazing, and Maguire told about getting some of the nitrate from Professor Blakesly, but he said he didn't tell him what he wanted it for. They also told of the part they had taken in the hazing, and said that it was customary to do something of that was customary to do something of that kind each year, and that they had not thought there was much barm in it. but they were sorry for what they had

assisted in getting the nitrate, acknowledged that he was one of the hazers, but was very unwilling to give any definite information and was finally excused from giving further testimony when it was found impossible to get him to throw any light on the matter. There were a number of other boys ready to acknowledge some portion of the responsibility for the affair, but they were not examined.

Principal George Thomas, from his investigation, learned that about 17 of the upper classmen participated in the hazing, and that eight or 10 of the freshmen were treated with nitrate of silver, having their faces blackened, but none of their injuries were permanent. He also ascertained that three separate bottles of sliver nitrate were us.
