



He says that the presence of strychnine in the bottle of bicarbonate of soda refutes all of the theories of nataral death. The styrchnine was a foreign substance, and it did not belong to the preparation of bicarbonate. Dr. Wood declares that the poison was thoroughly mixed with the bicarbonate of soda by some one who was thoroughly familiar with the strength and effect of strychnine, but he does not say that the strychnine was placed in the bottle with murder-ous intent. 

Trouble in Royal League. Chicago, March 13 .- A bill has been Chicago, March 13.—A bill has been filed in the United States circuit court of Illinois by F. C. Buchler of Cleve-land, O., alleging that Charles E. Fi-per, secretary, and William E, Hyde, Archon of the supreme council of the Royal League, r. fraternal society, have spent unlawfully more than \$30,000 be-longing during the last five years. It is a suit in equity to recover the money and to enjoin these officers from spend-ing any more money in the general fund illegally and unlawfully. The ability of the Royal League to pay its death losses to widows and orphans The ability of the Royal League to pay its death losses to widows and orphans and the safety of its reserve fund of \$500,000 are not questioned in the bill. In the bill Buehler states that this suit is a friendly one, brought for the good of the organization to compel the present officers to pay back the amounts illegally taken and to remove them from office so that those may succeed them who will abide by the laws and rules of the Royal League. Foreign Office at Tokio Says Imperial Forces Have Never Passed Through Mongolian Territory.

DECLARES RUSSIA IS GUILTY.

Has Drawn Supplies from There-Has Sent Armed Troops There Intimidating Princes.

Washington, March 13 .- From the foreign office at Tokio the Japanese legation has received a dispatch bearing on the report that the Russlan government has again drawn the attention of the powers to a statement to the effect that the Japanese troops were guilty of a violation of China's neutrality, as

a violation of China's neutrality, as their appearance behind the Russian army in the western part of Fentien province must have been effected by taking a route through Mongolia. "As a matter of fact," the Japanese dispatch from Tokio says, "the Im-perial forces have never passed through Mongolian territory, while Russia has long been drawing supplies from Mon-golia and always has been sending there disguised or armed troops which.

golia and always has been sending there disguised or armed troops which, intimidating native princes and people, have caused them to render assistance to Russians in the rear." "The dispatch from Toklo points out the following as the facts in evidence: "1--From the beginning of the war till last July Russia had at Halatokai and Lesserkoulon and in Kharochin district under the jurisdiction of the prince of Hintu some 200 soldlers de-talled for requisitioning horses and catalled for requisitioning horses and cat

2-In the latter part of last June a Russian force, consisting of some 50 troopers and artillerymen, proceeding from the neighborhood of Tieling and Kayuan, penetrated into the interior of Mongolia under the rule of Prince Pei, taking their route between Chung-chiatum and Wangan

"3-In last September a body of Rus-slan soldiers, together with a number of Manchurian and Mongolian soldiers in their employ, proceeded westward from the neighborhood of Tieling guarding 300 carts laden with arms and ammuni-tion, and passed through that part of Mongolia which is administered by the prince of Hintu to Paknoshu, near Lesserkoulon. At Paknoshu they met with resistance at the hands of the Chinese officials and people, and, being defeated, had the ammunition confis-cated by the magistrate of the Chao-yang district.
