Panama, March 13.—Col. William C. Gorgas, chief sanitary officer of the canal ozne, today transmitted to Gov. Magoon his report for the month of February. In that month no case of yellow fever or other quarantizable disease occurred within the canal ozne, though bubonic plague, yellow fever and smallpox are prevalent on the South American Pacific coast, and also at Barranquilla, Colombia, One case of yellow fever was reported at Boess del Toro, where Dr. Purnell has been sent. Among 23.00 canal employes the sick rate for the month was 20 per 1.000, and the deaths numbered seven whites and 20 negroes. Only one American died.

EFFORTS TO AVERT STRIKE OF MINERS

A Special National Convention Called by Mitchell to Discuss the Subject.

OPENS THURSDAY MORNING.

First Business Will be to Discuss Plan For Conference With the Operators.

Indianapolis, Ind., March 13 .- At the special national convention of the United Mine Workers of America, called by President Mitchell in response to the request of President Roosevelt to make efforts to avert a strike of all coal miners of the United States, the business of the first session which will open Thursday morning in this city, will be a discussion of plans for a joint conference with the bituminous operators in Indianapolis next week. Most of the officials are here, and the remainder will arrive tomorrow. There were a number of close conferences tonight at the headquarters among the higher officials of the organization and the board members. The national ex-ecutive board will hold an all-day meeting at their rooms tomorrow, at meeting at their rooms tomorrow, at which they will map out a line of work to be submitted to the delegates who will assemble Thursday morning. While all of the locals in the union will be represented in the convention, the numrepresented in the convention will not equal that of January, as many of the smaller locals are sending their proxies by representatives of other locals instead of by special delegates.


