A curious puzzle has been whittled out with a penknife by a man in Norwich, Conn. He has taken an eight ounce vial and set up in its interior a perfect keg about two inches long, with four hoops on it and both heads in; and he has stopped the bottle with a wooden plug which fits perfectly tight and is keyed inside, the keg planned and the pin toggled.

The descriptions of the new Catholic cathedral now in process of erection near Fifty-first street, in New York, are perfectly dazzling. The building will cost five millions of dollars and will probably be the most imposing ecclesiastical edifice in America. In the interior will be an arena of nearly forty thousand feet; there will be comfortable accommodations for fourteen thousand people, and in emergencies nineteen thousand people may be admitted. The largest New York church will not seat more than four thousand people, and as one of the reporters remarks, "the imagination fails to grasp the scene which will be presented when at the solemn dedication of this cathedral the sacred anthem of praise first swells through the majestic edifice."
