#### LIVE STOCK NOTES.

#### Owing to the scarcity of feed, many live stock owners at Holden. Millard county, have sent their cattle to Gunnison to feed for the winter.

A four-days' sale of purebred cattle, Shorthorns and Herefords, begins at Kansas City on Dec. 11.

Chicago Drovers' Journal: There is plenty of room out west yet for the energetic stock raiser. The eranges, instead of being overstocked, are in fact understocked in a great many places. The fact is, in a good season there is more grass than the cattle and sheep can keep mowed. In a very dry year, of course, there is often some dif-iculty in getting water, but the artesian wells are fast overcoming this dis-advantage and has made it possible to pasture land that before was undesirable.

Very few cattle will be wintered over in this part of Wisconsin this year, says the Oshkosh Times. It is all owing to the scarcity of feed, which has al-ready commenced to be felt. Hay has advanced to \$14 a ton, and there is no telling how far the price will ascend before spring. There being no alterna-tive farmers have already commenced to dispose of their caftle, at a good price, however. A well-known resident of the county is reported to have sold twenty-one cows, which leaves him only eighteen to winter over. His neighbors are following his example. There are comparatively few sheep raised in the county. This is said to be due to the number killed by dogs. A flock that has once been frightened never flourishes thereafter, no matter how much care it may received.
