His resolution names as the senate members Messrs. Nelson, Dolliver, Lodge, Erls-tow, Root, Tillman, Stone and Owen. Objection was made by Senator Ald-rich to the immediate adoption of the resolution and it was sent to the com-mittee on public lands. The postponement will smother the resolution until after leaders, in co-operation with the president and mem-bers of the cabinet, shall have had op-portunity to agree upon a program for the proposed inquiry. A joint resolution wit the senate and house is not favored on the ground that it would be cumbersome and a special committee is opposed because it is feared that there would be precipitated a scramble to have placed thereon men who are prejudiced either for or against the secretary. It is considered probable, therefore, that the decision, if the sen-ate determines the selection, will fall upon the senate committee on public lands. ability will be under arrest within 24 hours. Having obtained all the evidence necessary to proceed, the government began a general round-up today with the arrest of nine women and four men. All were arraigned and held for trial. Caroline Windmuller, held as being one of the principal offenders, gave ball for \$5,000. The others gave gurety in small-er amounts. It is alleged the government was de-frauded out of thousands of dollars by means of trunks containing imported finery which were left on steamship plers and secretly removed later. Chicago. Dec. 21.—Federal officials to-day arrested a number of persons who are alleged to be impleated in a con-spiracy to smuggle expensive gowns and dry goods into this country. Ar-rests were made in different parts of the country, two women in Chicago be-ing apprehended on a charge of having a part in a conspiracy to defraud the government, which has already suc-ceeded in smuggling across the line more than \$2,000,000 worth of dutiable goods.

goods. There are 26 charged with aiding in the conspiracy and all of these have been indicted by the federal grand jury in New York. The women arrested in Chicago are Mary Weber, also known as Madame Whitney, propuletor of an establishment, and Katrine Schwartz.

## FIRE IN INSANE ASYLUM.

FIRE IN INSAME ASTION. Jacksonville, Ill., Dec. 21.—Fire to-night destroyed three wards of the north annex of the central hospital for the insame here, entailing a loss of about \$40,000. No lives were lost and no patients escaped. One hundred and eighty women patients were removed in safety from the burning wards and were housed in the men's department. In a few instances the women ran back into their rooms and hid themselves under beds or in closets. As a result, four had narrow escapes. All were

rescued. Attendant McElroy found an aged woman huddled in bed. Although the woman fought desperately amid blind-ing smoke and flames, he carried her out.
