Republican France Gives Him an Enthusiastic Reception.

WORE A MARSHAL'S UNIFORM

As Ee Alighted From Train Pres dent Loubet Stepped Forward and Grasped Him by the Hand.

Paris, May 1 .- King Edward arrived here this afternoon and was accorded a hearty reception by repliblican France. His majesty's welcome at the Dauphine rallway station by President Loubet and the chief officers of staff, and his drive through the avenue of the Bols de Boulogne and the Champs Elysees presented a succession of brilllan spectacles. Everywhere the populace gave the king an enthusiastic greeting. King Edward showed the keenest appreciation of French good will. Only scattered shouts of "Fashoda!" and "Kruger!" were heard, and they were lost in the tremendous volume of demonstrative approval, Vast crowds filled the boulevards from the early hours, people struggling to gain vantage points along the route to

be followed by the royal procession. President Loubet was surrounded by the cabinet ministers, the presidents of the senate and the chamber of depu-ties, the grand commander of the Le-gion of Honor, the military and naval dignitaries and the diplomatic corps. As the train entered the station the trumpets sounded a royal salute and the band played "God Save the King."

King Edward descended from his car and advanced slowly and alone, smiling and saluting. He wore the scar-let uniform of the British field marshal, his chapeau topped by waving red and white plumes and his breast decorated with various insignia, including the cross of the Legion of Honor. Pres-dent Loubet stepped forward and grasped the king's hands. The meet-ing between the sovereign and the president was cordial, almost demon-strative. M. Loubet welcomed the king to France, and the king expressed his thanks for the splendid manifesta-

tion in his honor. King Edward and the members of his party entered state carriages with gorgeously clad postillions and outriders, and, escorted by a regiment of culrassiers, drove to the British em-bassy. The route of the procession was through the beautiful Avenue du Beis de Boulogne and the Avenue des Champs Elysees, arched with chestnut trees in full bloom. The lowering clouds which marked the earlier part of the day had broken up, and the sun came forth.

The avenues were lined with solid ranks of dragoons, cuirassiers, horse artillery, field batteries and infantry, guns, helmets and other trappings gleaming in the sunlight. Behind these martial walls the people were banked, and all the trees, windows and balconies and housetops were crowded

DEAD NUMBER SEVENTY.

Known Victims of the Great Disaster at Frank, N. W. T.

aster at Frank, N. W. T, Bakersfield, Cal., May L.-Walton E. Dowlan, consulting engineer of the American Canadian Coal & Coke Min-ing company, which owns the mine at Frank, N. W. T, now in Bakersfield, received two telegrams this afternoon from the late disaster giving authentic reports from the company's representa-tives on the ground. The number of dead is known to be seventy, mostly women and children, all in the town. No one was killed at the mine and two men supposed at first to be suffocated. have been taken out alive. Six cot-tages and several outside buildings be-longing to the company were destroyed. The mine itself is perfectly intact and the resumption of operations is being delayed only by the necessity of wait-ing on the railroad to get its tracks morder. The cause of the disaster was entirely disconnected from the mine and was the slide of limestone from Turtle mountain.
