VICTIM OF HEART TROUBLE.
Mrs. Christina Swensen of Vineyard Gone to Her Rest.
Provo, Utah Co., Dec. 15.—Mrs. Christina Swensen of Vineyard died yesterday from an affection of the heart, at the home of her daughter, Mrs. Thomas Spaulding of the First ward, this city. Mrs. Swensen was a native of Denmark, where she was born April 10, 1852. She came to Utah with her

husband, the late Gustav Swensen, and located in Payson, living there for 15 years, then moving to Vineyard, where she lived till about a year ago, when she came to Provo to live with her daughter. The deceased leaves one son and two daughters, and numerous other relatives and friends. Funeral services will be held tomorrow (Saturday) at the First ward meetinghouse, commencing at 1 o'clock.

INDUSTRIAL SCHOOL.

Has 58 Boys and 13 Girls as Inmates: 143 on Parole.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—The State Industrial School board held its regular monthly meeting last evening. Pres. Joseph was not present, being absent in New York, but board members T. E. Evans and E. M. Conroy with Secretary Hollingsworth transacted the business.

Supt. Thomas submitted a lengthy report on the present condition of the school. His report showed its attendance at the school December 1, 58 boys and 13 girls, on parole 143, making a total of 214 under the jurisdiction of the school management. During the past month 28 inmates were received at the school and 32 paroled, which in the way of releases from the institution is a good record.

The board paroled two boys last evening, one to be taken by his parents to Chicago and the other one goes to Los Angeles with his parents.

In the matter of the habeas corpus proceedings brought in behalf of Harry Benson, committed recently from Salt Lake City, the board received a communication from County Attorney P. C. Christensen of Salt Lake who prosecuted the case against Benson, setting forth that he will not appear in Ogden Saturday to defend the state in the case. The board considered the matter and decided to refer the same to Attorney General Breiden, whose duty it is to defend all state officers, when such proceedings are brought against them and it is expected he will appear here Saturday to protect the state's interest in the case.

LITTLE BOY'S FOOT AMPUTATED.

Albert Smalley Crippled for Life by Accident on the Rail.

Ogden, Dec. 15.—Albert Smalley, the little 6-year-old son of John Smalley, the jeweler, has suffered the amputation of his leg just above the ankle. The operation was performed by Drs. H. J. Powers and E. M. Conroy at the home of the little fellow's parents on Twenty-fifth street.

It will be remembered that the little Smalley boy was playing about two weeks ago at the home of a lady friend near the Rio Grande western railway freight depot. While the lady was not watching him and her little boy closely they left the doorway and went into the freight yard. The boy, who had jumped on a freight car they thought was standing still. Just then the car was moved by a switch engine, and the little fellow fell with his leg caught in the wheels. Though his foot was badly crushed the physicians used every effort to save the boy's limb, but when they found it impossible they decided to amputate it. He is resting as well as can be expected.

PIANO IN SHERIFF'S OFFICE.

In the case of the Clayton Music company against M. O. DeLaney and wife, brought to recover possession of a piano sold defendant, or \$300 judgment, the music company got out a writ of replevin, which was served on the possession of Sheriff Bailey, who took possession of the piano and had it removed to his office, where it will remain until the case is settled. The plaintiff was required to furnish a \$500 bond before the piano could be touched.

GREEK'S STORE ATTACHED.

An attachment was issued yesterday and served on Joseph Bozios, who runs a little store at 365 Twenty-fifth street, and his entire stock was taken into the possession of the sheriff on the writ. The Shupe-Williams candy company brought suit against Bozios to recover \$97.50, alleged to be due for merchandise sold him by the plaintiff. Defendant confessed judgment, the execution was issued and notices of sale posted up, stating that the goods attached will be sold Dec. 20, at noon at 365 Twenty-fifth street.

ENGINEER DROPS DEAD.

At 1 o'clock this morning John Shannon, a locomotive engineer, fell dead in the St. Louis beer hall, where he was visiting in going the rounds of the town with a number of friends. His death came unexpectedly, he simply seizing his side and then lunging forward with a cry of pain. Shannon has been employed for some time in the Ogden grill rooms as he has been out of his professional employment. He was 45 years of age and unmarried.
