

EVERYTHING FREE AT TRACK TODAY

Tomorrow Will See Close of
Best Meet in State's
History.

ELKS HAD FUN YESTERDAY.

Features Were the Chariot Races and
The Mule Races—How Judge Diehl
"Pulled" for Salt Lake.

No admission will be charged at the
state fair track this afternoon. Everybody
will be admitted free of charge. So an-
nounced Manager W. S. Jones yesterday
afternoon. Tomorrow will see the close
of the greatest horse race meet in the
history of the state, and Mr. Jones is be-
lieving in all quarters for the specta-
tore he has given each day.

Yesterday was the biggest day of the
meeting. There was fun in plenty, and
any event was worth the price of admis-
sion. It was Elks day and the herd made
the most of it.

THINGS THAT WERE BEING.

Trotters, pacers, runners, chariots, mule
races, owners, drivers, jockeys, book-
makers and touters met the gaze of the
track patrons yesterday afternoon. The
crowd was a large one and would have
been larger but for the fact that there
was some mix-up in announcing the time
of the races. They were set for 1:30. One
wagon on the street advertised it at 2:15,
and still another at 4:30. What reason
there was for the latter is hard to say,
but at the track it was freely
said the purpose was to knock Manager
Jones and his race—the best he have
seen here.

The main features yesterday were the
chariot races and the mule races. The
chariot races were handled by Judge
Diehl with four horses about. Devine
got away in the lead but before the track
circled Leary took the lead and got
on the pole. One of Devine's horses began
to act badly, and all of them appeared
to be tired. But it was certainly an ex-
citing race for both drivers and all the spec-
tators of the animals possible. Leary had
the speediest team. The horses belong to
Ben Hartzel, and Ben declares they are
standard bred jacks. The drivers thought
the race was half a mile but discovered
their mistake. Devine tried hard to jump
into the lead again but failed.

FUN IN MULE RACES.

The mule races were the goods all right.
There were five entries. G. R. Cleveland
represented Salt Lake. Cleveland
while Judge W. C. Diehl drove
for Provo. Cleveland was more
about his mule than the other
handlers. Cleveland's mule was
Bureau and Western Park City. Morley
had the favorite mule, a great big
animal that could run fast. This animal would
have won the race but for a couple of
persons who were betting against him.

The animals did not take a flying start.
They were all lined up under the wire and
gave a standing start. The race was for
a mile and a half. Any one please
to go every other day. On Thursday
the afternoon big blue mule had a
generous lead and was leading it off quite
easily when the persons who were betting
against a pair of mules at the animal
show at the entrance to the track
looked at the mule. When Mr. Mule

merely "laughed."

race was won by Jack McGinnis. This speedy
animal broke the record for a mile on a
half-mile track. The Elks was also
brought to go some, however, to beat Red
Hamel and Los Angeles.

The fifth race was called off because

WILL FINISH TOMORROW.

That Will Be End of the Yachting Ses-
sion in West.

Chicago, July 28.—The yachting season
in the west reaches its climax today as
the fleet of the Chicago Yacht club and the
representatives of the Detroit and Cleve-
land clubs, sail for the Detroit and Cleve-
land regatta. The fleet will start at 10
a. m. and will be back in Chicago at 10
p. m. The fleet will consist of the long
cruising races, the former at Chicago, the
latter at Port Huron and Detroit. The

smooth and light.

mination of Miss Wright, a member
of the club, to race her boat, the "Alice"
(Ellen). Two young women will assist
her, and there will be no men on board.

Prizes will be given for the winner in
each class, to the first boat in, and to
the one making the best time on time al-
lowsance.

After the race the Chicago and Detroit
yachts will cruise to the north channel
and Georgian bay.
