SECRETARY EDWARDS **ENTERS RATE BRIEF**

Says Railroads in Utah Are Willing to Foster and Develop Fruit Industry of State.

Secretary J. Edward Taylor of the state board of horticulture gave out last evening the following statement, giving the railroads credit for aiding in the development of the fruit indus-

"It would seem from the articles appearing daily in one of our local newspapers that the railroads in Utah are doing everything in their power to hinder, if not destroy, the development of Utah industries, and from a statement in today's issue it would seem that this oppression was also directed against the fruit industry.

"In justice to the railroad companies,

it is hardly fair to allow this statement to go unchallenged. I have had the pleasure of being connected with the state board of horticulture during the state board of horticulture during the last three years, and this board has been working to develop Utah's fruit industry. During this entire time we have found the railroad companies willing to do all in their power to foster and promote this industry, and their services have been very valuable "Our board has made exhibits in Bolse, Ida; Sacramento, Cal.; Albuquerque, N. M., and Council Bluffs, Ia. These exhibits have had for their main object the advertising of the fruit in-

object the advertising of the fruit industry. In this work we have found the railroad companies willing to help, and the efficiency of the exhibits has been greatly increased by their assistance. In fact, the exhibit at Council Pluss 15, which execute their favora-Bluffs, Ia., which created such favorable impression for Utah, was made possible by the earnest and substantial support given by the railroad compa-nies in furnishing the car and carrying this exhibit to and from Council Bluffs without charge "During the past summer I was one

"During the past summer I was one of the committee which worked for the adjustment of eastern seaboard freight rates on green fruit, and again we found the railroad company willing to make such rates as would allow Utah to compete on equal terms with our friends in Colorado

"One of the important features of the work of our board is the holding of

"One of the important features of the work of our board is the holding of meetings among the fruit growers of the state, and in this work through the concessions extended by the railroad we have been able to hold ten such meetings, where it would have been possible to hold only one had it not been for the assistance given by these companies.

companies.

"As the fruit industry grows, there will no doubt be some necessity for an adjustment of freight rates, and I haven't the least doubt but that these adjustments will be made promptly and willingly when the time comes, and when they are properly presented to the railroad company. It is a common experience throughout the United States that the railroad companies are States that the railroad companies are very active in developing the agricultural interests, at least. Take, for instance, the work of G. Harold Powell of the United States department of agriculture, who did such valuable experimental work along the lines of fruit refrigeration. We find the railroad companies spending upwards of a million dollars to perfect this system of million dollars to perfect this system of refrigeration, which promises to revolutionize the shipping of fruit and bring thousands of dallars to the pockthe assistance of the rallroads it would have been impossible for the fruit growers to derive the benefit of this work in so short a time, especially if they had depended entirely upon the public for the capital to develop and perfect the system. 


