Dispatch to Fort Douglas from Wash-Ington, D. C., Asks for Blacks smiths and Wheelwrights.

A telegram was received at Fort Douglas today from the war department, Washington, D. C., asking for blacksmiths and veterinary surgeons for service in the Philippines. It is required that the blacksmiths be also farriers and wheelwrights, and to such by Governor Wells who, as announced as would like to engage in the service of the government for one year in the islands, 75 per month will be given. The ffer of \$100 per month is made to experienced veterinary surgeons. who may be desirous of accepting an offer of this kind are requested to en quire of the quartermaster at For Douglas for further particulars. The dispatch also states that all who ente he service will have free transports ion to the islands and return at the xpiration of the year's service. the accept this government position will be expected to leave for Manila on the 16th inst as that is the date set the departure of the transport from San Francisco.

NEW BICYCLE ORDINANCE. Where Wheelmen Must Ride Hereafter -Penalty for Violation.

At the meeting of the council last night Hartenstein's bicycle ordinance was passed. The ordinance merely extends the bicycle limits and provides

egulations for the wheelmen. The restricted district in the future will be bounded as follows: South Tem-ple street from Eighth East to Fourth ple street from Eighth East to Fourth West, Fourth West to Sixth South, Sixth South to Eighth East, Eighth East to South Temple. On the North of South Temple the restricted district is South Temple on J street to Third street, Third street to City creek. All within this district including the boundary streets are in the excluded district.

The ordinance provides that in the non-restricted districts wheelmen are not allowed to ride on the walks at (reater speed than four miles per hour Within the restricted district it is for bidden to pass any street intersection or turn any corner when any pedestrian or vehicle is near, or at any place where any person may be entering or leaving any street our at any intersection, at a rate of speed greater than four miles per hour, nor shall more than two such riding machines travel abreast, nor shall it be lawful for any person to carry any child or children upon any such riding machine.

A path has been reserved for the bicyclists eight feet in width in the center of all streets in the restricted district and where a railroad runs through the street a strip two feet wide reserved upon either side of the track and all wagons, carriages and animals prohibited from going on these paths except to cross them at right The street supervisor is instructed to keep these paths in order. a fine of not less than \$5 and not more than \$75 for each offence, the wheel of the offender to be taken by the officer making the urrest as security for

McKinley Anxlous to Carry the Bees hive State-Gov, Wells Feels Confident of Republican Victory.

Col. Roosevelt, the Republican candidate for Vice President of the United States, has given his word that he will visit Utah during the caurse of the campaign and make several speeches while here. Mr. Roosevelt then signified his intention of making a visit to Utah. While in Washington Governor Wells called upon President McKinley.
