## FRANCE.

The Prussians have blown up the bridge at Clery and returned to camp at Beaugency.

The Constituent, to-day, announced that Lord Lyons, the British Minister, made an important communication to the government here. He wishes, aided by Austria and Italy, to effect an armistice in order that the election of members to constitute the Assembly may proceed. He stated that Russia, would act in the same direction. The government has not yet ret rued a formal reply.

The journals of Lyons demand the immediate adoption of vigorous and defensive measures. They say the Prussians have been seen turning Besancon and other strong places, and may march direct on Lyons. The forts and defences of the lattercity are ready but there is a lack of experienced gunners. A large number of these have been sent forward from Toulon.

Tours, 23 - An important action is reported in the forest of Hecourt. The French scouts belonging to Ardeebe's battalion and the France Tireurs of Loen behaved with much gallantry. The Prussian force, consisting of cavalry, fantry and artillary was repulse with the loss of a hundred killed. Our casualties were severe. Lephase, of Nantes, publishes a letter from Brest, stating that the American volunteers were treated neglectfully by the authorities upon their arrival. s understood that strict orders have been forwarded by the government that all other volunteers on their arrival shall be treated with the utmost care. At a meeting of the Council to-day, it s reported that the subject of the election of members of the constitutional assembly was discussed. It is also reported that the council was informed by Lord Lyons that he had received orders from his government to announce its desire to act in conjunction with Austria and Italy. The answer of Gambetta was that the council could do nothing without the concurrence of the Government at Paris. It is understood that the prepara-tions for the national defence are now so great that the government will not accept peace, save upon a liberal basis. At Paris the determination is also evident to make a defence to the last, unless honorable terms of peace can be obtained. It is reported that the Prus-sian forces now occupying Orleans are committing such excesses, that it is be-lieved they are determined to leave
