LEAP YEAR PARTY.—A Leap Year party was held last evening in the Social Hall, under the management of Mrs. Joseph A. Young, Mrs. B. Young, Jr., Mrs. W. S. Godbe, Mrs. F. A. Mitchell, Mrs. H. Park and Miss C. Cobb. We never attended a party where the gentlemen mustered in such force for the number of ladies as they did last evening. The number of black coats gave the assembly a sombre appearance that is not common to our entertainments at ordinary parties. Mrs. M. G. Clawson acted as Floor Manager, and contrived to extract all the amusement possible from the occasion. Her call for those gentlemen who, in consequence of their lack of attractions, had been compelled to sit as wall flowers, to select partners for a dance, provoked considerable merriment; also her call for the extra gentlemen for whom 3 1/2 cents had been paid to select partners. OBITUARY.—Phineas H. Young, the son of President Joseph Young, Senr., died yesterday at 5 o'clock a.m., of pneumonia. The deceased was born at Winter Quarters, December 31st, 1847. He was a young man of much promise, and gave remarkable evidence of being in possession of talents of a high order. Though but a youth, he has left some very fine specimens of art, one of which—a portrait of his uncle, President Brigham Young, stood near his coffin to-day. The funeral services were attended to at 1 o'clock to-day, at the house of his father, in the 13th Ward. A large number of relatives and friends of the family were present, who were addressed by Elders Geo. Q. Cannon and Lorenzo D. Young. His death has been most unexpected. The deceased was from childhood very feeble, and his lungs have been affected; but during his sickness he seemed so sanguine and buoyant that those who visited him had but little fear as to the result.
