

WILL MAKE WAR ON BLACK HAND

Professional and Business Men Among Chicago Italians Are Fully Aroused.

FORM WHITE HAND SOCIETY.

Will Call on Mayor Russe and Ask Him to Supplement Their Efforts.

Chicago, Nov. 18.—Aroused by increasing boldness on the part of desperate blackmailers, masquerading under the name of the "Black Hand," professional and business men among the Italians of Chicago yesterday organized the White Hand society.

From now on the Mano Bianco-Black Hand—will wage a war of extermination against the Mano Nera-Black Hand society.

The crusade has been started by the two leading Sicilian societies of Chicago.

TheUnione Siciliana, the strongest Sicilian society in the west, consisting of more than 1,000 members, met for the purpose of organizing against the "Black Hand." Similar action was taken by the Societa Trinitaria, of 2,000 members.

The Italian chamber of commerce, with its 250 members, also is on record as approving the movement and will give its moral and financial support to the White Hand. The Italian consul, Chevalier Guido Sabetta, is one of the leaders.

It is the purpose of the White Hand society to fight the blackmailers in a courageous, systematic manner. A fund of \$10,000 will be raised for this purpose. Dr. C. Volini headed the subscription list with \$500. He has received letters within the last week threatening the lives of his four children unless he submitted to an extortion of \$5,000.

A committee of 15 of the White Hand society will call upon Mayor Russe and demand that the police supplement the efforts of the special staff of detectives that will be engaged by the Italians. The same committee will call upon State's Atty. Healy, Postmaster Campbell, Capt. Thomas J. Porter, of the United States secret service, Postoffice Inspector James E. Stuart and Dist. Atty. F. W. Sims.

A number of the groups of blackmailers are known already to the White Hand society. Some of them are small politicians and are under the impression that they have the protection of the city and county authorities. At least half a dozen blackmailers are either ex-convicts or fugitives from Italy. It will be one of the first aims of the White Hand society to see that the fugitives are returned to their own country to serve prison sentences.

McLAUGHLIN TRAGEDY.

Coroner's Verdict is Father Killed Daughter Then Himself.

Santa Cruz, Cal., Nov. 18.—An inquest was held here yesterday over the bodies of Maj. Frank McLaughlin and his daughter Agnes. The jury rendered a verdict that Miss McLaughlin met death by a gunshot wound inflicted by her father, and McLaughlin by poison self-taken with suicidal intent. Arrangements are being completed for a private funeral to be held Wednesday, after which the bodies will be shipped to Newark, N. J., where they are to be entombed with the body of Mrs. McLaughlin, which has been kept in vault in this city since her death two years ago.

FIRE IN KANSAS CITY.

Body of An Unidentified Woman Found in the Ruins.

Kansas City, Nov. 18.—The body of an unidentified woman, supposed to be a janitress, was found in one of the rooms of the Missouri building at 2 o'clock this morning after the fireman had subdued a fire that ruined the interior of the building. The woman is still unconscious and may die. The loss on the Missouri office building is \$25,000.

The Kansas City Star building and the Cora Belt bank building and adjoining, were only slightly damaged, and the Associated Press building in the latter building escaped injury altogether.

The Kansas City Star sustained a loss of \$20,000, caused by water. Nine hundred rolls of white paper and other property in the basement of the Star building were ruined.

SICIL IN CHICAGO.

Chicago, Nov. 18.—Six million dollars in new clearing house checks, kept in active circulation probably will be sufficient to meet the financial needs of Chicago until normal conditions return, according to estimates made yesterday by those in close touch with the situation. At the opening of business today there was in circulation or ready for disbursement at the banks, \$2,425,000 in the new medium.

HAYWOOD TO VISIT NEW YORK.

New York, Nov. 18.—William D. Haywood, acquitted of participation in the assassination of ex-Gov. Steiwer of Idaho, is expected in New York within the next few weeks. At the Central Federated Union meeting, Sunday, Albert Abraham, secretary of the Postoffice department, said that a demonstration will be arranged in his honor.

CONGO ATROCITIES ARE SOMETHING HORRIBLE.

Chicago, Nov. 18.—Blatant misstatements that Prof. Starr of the University of Chicago, was misinformed or lacking in observation when he reported last week that there were no atrocities in the Congo Free state, were made last night by the Rev. Joseph Clark, 30 years a missionary in those regions. In a talk on "The truth about the Congo," at Hull House, "Prof. Starr said that he had never been in any of the regions in which he proclaimed that there were no atrocities, and pointedly told me that he did not want to be shown any evidence when he was at my mission because he did not want to get into the controversy," said the missionary.

is president, Marcellus S. Woolley, vice president, Severo R. Tuttle, secretary and Freeman Morningstar, treasurer. The shares of the new company, of the par value of \$100 each. The new concern takes over all the business of the real estate firm known as Tuttle Brothers.

P. Morgan, the fourth of five; and Schubert, the thirteenth of 14.

Some Very Expensive Strikes

The worst strike so far in results was that England had seen for many years past lasted only a month. This was the great London dock strike of 1889, when \$2,000,000 went out for a penny on dock strike wages. London as a port has never recovered from the disastrous effect of that strike.

The longest first manning strike which has been seen in this country for a generation was that of the Amalgamated Society of Engineers in 1901. It began on July 2, and the object was an eight-hour day. By October there were 7,000 men idle. Thousands more were distributed in strike pay, but the strike became very serious. In November a conference was arranged between the employers and the representatives of the strikers, but it moved a failure. The men struck for 1 year and 10 months. The strike cost the country at least five millions and possibly twice that amount.

It was in October, 1900, that the men employed by the late Lord Penrhyn in his enormous Welsh slate quarries at Bethesda struck in a body. The quarries between them and their employer had begun in 1882, and there had been numerous partial strikes previous to the great one. This Bethesda strike was chiefly caused by low wages, and by the fact that the men were only paid once a month.

A strike of 1900 holds the record for being the longest strike which this country has seen for nearly half a

century past. It went on until November, 1901. During those long three years \$36,000,000 was lost in wages alone, and whereas at the beginning of it we imported no slate into this country, at the end of it we were bringing in over 1,000 tons of foreign slate a week.

A very old strike began in 1809, when the cotton spinners in Manchester, England, struck. They stayed out for very nearly a year, at a cost of over \$200,000, before the owner succeeded in persuading them that the so-called "Manchester law" was nothing but a mass of phantoms—phantoms—phantoms.
