

sons were drowned. There is a flood at Cheerwell valley, England. The crops, especially hay, suffered severely.

Gildersleeve has written a letter to Mildmay, secretary of the council, saying that he accepts the cup offered by the British riflemen for competition by the Americans, and will invite the members of the team to shoot for it.

LONDON, 16. — Dispatches from Cardiff say that the rivers Taff and Ely have overflowed and the adjacent lands are under water for miles; a great quantity of live stock have been washed away, and hundreds of inhabitants of Grange-town have removed to Cardiff in boats.

Much damage has been done in Devonshire by rain storms. The rivers and streams are swollen, and there have been inundations in several places.

The American rifle team will compete individually, at Wimbledon, for the Albert cup, valued at five hundred pounds, the Arthur rifle, worth one hundred pounds, the Derby and St. Ledger sweepstakes, and for a hundred and ninety-two extra prizes.

Shortly after the American riflemen arrived at Wimbledon to-day, Lord Wharnclyff and Col. Phillips visited them and accompanied them to the council's tents, where they were received by Secretary Mildmay, and after the usual courtesies, the Americans were shown over the camp; they will shoot first to-morrow, in the St. Ledger sweepstakes, at 200 yards; each competitor has ten shots.

The weather is unusually cold. The rain ceased this morning, and the water in the inundated districts is subsiding.

VIENNA, 15. — The Emperor of Germany has arrived at Ischt, where he is the guest of the Emperor of Austria.

LONDON, 16. — The Financier states that the amount of coin and bullion in the Bank of England now is the largest ever known.

ST. JOHN, Que., 16. — The steamer Champlain, which ran on a rock at Saw Mill Rock, sank in 15 minutes and it is supposed she is broken in two.

LONDON, 18. — John Rigby, of the Irish team, tied Fulton in shooting for the St. Ledger stakes yesterday, making 35 points; the contest will be finished to-morrow. Sir Wharnclyff entertains the American team at dinner to-day, at Wimbledon; Lady Wharnclyff, Lt. Col. Phillips, Mr. Mildmay, Captain Peel, and a number of other prominent persons will be present.

A meeting was held in Hyde Park to-day to protest against the grant for the Prince of Wales' trip to India. One hundred and twenty thousand persons were present. Bradlaugh made a violent speech, and concluded by offering a resolution of a similar character. The resolution was adopted almost unanimously. Eight persons who voted against it were set upon by the crowd, and the police had to interfere for their protection.

PANAMA, 18. — Advices from Salvador state that a dreadful riot took place at San Miguel, a town of 40,000 inhabitants, in the southern part of the republic. A great deal of discontent had been excited against the government by its refusal to allow the pastoral of the bishop of Salvador, written in a tone hostile to the laws, to be read in the churches; there had also been considerable hostile feeling among the lower classes owing to some regulation requiring dealers to use a new market place, and while matters were in this state a priest named Palacios preached a violent sermon against the constituted authorities on the 20th ult., and on that evening a mob arose and attacked the cabildo, and liberated some 200 prisoners; they then proceeded to assault the small garrison at the Cuarete, and killed generals Espinosa and Castro. They cut the former to pieces, and threw the pieces at each other; they split the skull of General Castro and threw him over the wall, where he was picked up by his mother, and died in three days. The garrison was nearly all assassinated, and many prominent citizens were killed. After this the fanatical mob set

fire to sixteen houses with kerosene, but before the town was entirely destroyed it fortunately happened that H. B. M. ship Fantome was at La Union, where she landed her marines, which allowed the garrison there, united with some troops from Amapala, in Honduras, to march to the relief of San Miguel, and put down the mob. Cuarete Palacio, at last accounts, was arrested, with others that had participated in the outbreak, and a good many inferior rioters had been shot by order of President Gonzales, who had arrived with troops. The houses destroyed and pillaged and the other damage is estimated at one million dollars, and commercial failures are looked for in consequence. The country has been declared in a state of siege, and the President is taking measures to establish order and bring the perpetrators of this disgraceful outbreak to punishment. The Dario, the official journal of the State, and all the public prints, abound in indignant articles about the priests, who were the instigators of this savage and sanguinary affair, and the Capelutar vicar, for the edict published by his order, and Jose Manuel Palacios, ex-Canonero of the cathedral of San Salvador. The municipality of this city asked to have Palacios removed, but the Curia Ecclesiastico paid no attention to the petition. He was continually exciting hatred between the lower and well-to-do classes, and the result has just been described. One curious and incredible discovery was made after the murderous affair was over, and that was that on the persons of some of the dead rebels were found passports, which read when translated—"Peter, open to the bearer the gates of Heaven, who has died for religion," signed, George, Bishop of San Salvador, and sealed with the seal of the bishopric of San Salvador.

LONDON, 19. — Lady Franklin, widow of Sir John Franklin, died last night.

The ties of Saturday, at Wimbledon, for the St. Ledger sweepstakes, were shot off to-day. Fulton, of the Americans won, Mitchell second, Rigby third.

The court opened at 2.30. Judge Boreman announced that the jury roll had better be called, to ascertain if there were any who were incompetent in order that such might be permitted to go. Thirty-three answered to their names, only one being found ineligible, after which they were discharged till 9 a. m. to-day.

The case of The People vs. Goodman was called. Defendant appeared and, on stating that he had no counsel, Judge Loeber and Mr. Swift were appointed to defend him, and the case was continued till to-day.

The Judge stated that he had received a communication from some of the jurors, who desired to know something about their compensation, etc. He said the marshal had a reasonable amount of funds, and would pay it out as far as it went. As the Territory had made no provision for the payment of jurors' fees, this was the best that could be done at present.

Adjourned till to-day at 9 a. m.

The morning session, to-day, was entirely consumed by the case of the People vs. Goodman, for assault with intent to do bodily injury, which was continued from yesterday. The jury retired to deliberate at 12 m., at which time the Court took a recess at 2 p. m.

After recess the jury came into court and returned a verdict of "not guilty," and the prisoner was discharged.

Beaver Enterprise, July 13—

We are creditably informed that there is a great complaint about letters delivered at the Beaver Post Office being broken open. Where the fault lies none but the guilty party or parties know, but the fact exists, and the matter should be sifted to the bottom. We would suggest to Postmaster Poole to look after this matter and aid in hurling some mail thief from office. It has become intolerable.

The Second District Court room yesterday morning was crowded to suffocation sometime before the proceedings commenced. The Associated Press and several newspa-pers were represented, places hav-ing been reserved for newspapers by Marshal Maxwell. At about a quarter past 11 Judge Boreman entered the court room and proceed-ed to the bench when Deputy Mar-shal Stokes announced the open-ing of the court. All hats were removed in a twinkling, and there was such a murmur of subdued voices throughout the room, that scarcely a word could be heard from the attorneys present. This was finally overcome, and the business proceeded. Mr. Patterson was sworn as stenographer.

Shortly after order had been ob-tained, Mr. Geo. C. Bates arose and requested the indulgence of being heard upon an affidavit, which he proceeded to offer. His remarks were abruptly terminated by the Court, who said—"Mr. Bates you are not authorized to appear in this court until you are permitted to do so."

Mr. Bates—"I beg your honor's pardon; I did not think of that."

Judge—"I think you ought to have known it."

Mr. Bates (sitting down)—"I ask your honor's pardon."

Soon after, however, the Judge permitted Mr. Bates to present the matter he had in hand if he desired, but the latter gentleman decided to await the arrival of Mr. Suther-land.

The criminal docket was called and the cases all passed for the time being. Court adjourned till 2 p. m.

After recess the attendance was fully as large as in the morning.
