## THE UTAHNA THEATER SOLD.

Murderous Assault on Japanese—Deputy Sheriff Belnap Resigns—Hon. Wm. Driver Retires.

Ogden, July 2.—A murderous assault was made on a Japanese laborer Saturday evening by hicks while he was asleep near the West Weber southern Pacific station. Weak from loss of blood, with a long ugly gash in the left side of his neck towards the back the injured man was brought to Ogden on Southern Pacific passenger train No. 4. He was taken to the Japanese hospital flat where Dr. M. Takeoka, the Japs' surgeon, sewed the wound and gave him some attention. Later in the night he was taken to the Ogden general hospital where he is now doing satisfactorily.

The story of the assault as told by a fellow countryman who came to Ogden with the wounded man, was that a number of the Japanese laborers had laid down to rest in the shade after a hard day's work, and they fell to sleep. George A. Storck, a nine-year-old boy, just the first joint of his right thumb yesterday by breaking a terrace cane. The boy held his thumb over the end of the cane and struck the head of the cane on the ground. The concussion caused an explosion which tore off the thumb. The iron end of the cane, which is ordinarily attached to the ground or some hard substance to cause the explosion, was broken from the cane.

Willard Smith has entered a plea of not guilty to assault, pleaded from the justice's court in the case of Provo City vs. Willard Smith; hearing has been set for Aug. 3.
