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How to Cook Rice.—D. Talmage and Sons, of New York give the following information regarding the proper method of cooking rice:

Rice is becoming a much more popular article of food than heretofore. It is frequently substituted for potatoes at the chief meal of the day, being a more nutritious and much more readily digested. At its present cost, it is relatively cheaper than potatoes, oatmeal or grain-grits of any kind. In preparing it only just enough cold water should be poured on to prevent the rice from burning at the bottom of the pot, which should have a close fitting cover, and with a moderate fire the rice steamed rather than boiled until it is nearly done; then the cover is taken off, the surplus steam and moisture allowed to escape, and the mass turns a mass of snow-white kernels, each separate from the other, and as much superior to the usual soggy mass, as a fine meal potato is superior to the water-soaked article.

Horrible Accident.—As train No. 5 was leaving Canas Station, last night, Conductor Wyatt Pool attempted to get into the caboose, but slipped and fell under the wheels, having both his legs cut off above the knees. He died in a few moments. His remains were taken to Eagle Rock, where an inquest will be held to-day. Owing to the large amount of other work, the company have not built any cabooses, ordinary box cars being used in their stead, the only entrance being on the side, the getting into one of them while the train is in motion always being attended with danger. Mr. Pool was an active young man, unmarried, and has a brother occupying a similar position on the road. - *Blackfoot Register* of Saturday.

Accidentally Injured.—A correspondent of the *Enquirer* wrote from Salina, Sevier Co. June 5th.

A serious accident occurred here this morning to a son of George Williams, (a boy about ten years of age). It seems that he had been around a deserted camp and among other things picked up a giant powder cartridge. Not knowing what it was, he tried by the aid of a hammer to drive it into a piece of lumber, the result of which was an explosion, carrying away the joints of his thumb and middle finger. Mr. James Robbins and Mr. John Leonard dressed the hand of the little sufferer, who now seems to be resting comfortably.

Calder and Joseph E. Taylor, were present.

Nearing Completion.—The Denver and Rio Grande Railway, between here and Provo, has now a short gap of two miles only to complete. It is expected that trains will be running over it this week. The junction with the Bingham and Wasatch & Jordan Valley railroads will be near Cooper's, about one mile west of the present junction of the Bingham and Utah Central roads.

A Hard Case.—Harry Black, the convicted burglar who escaped from the penitentiary a short time since and was captured at Evanston, was known in that vicinity by the name of Bayler, having formerly served a six months' term in the Utah County, Wyoming, jail. He was caught by Sheriff Dietz, of Evanston. Black alias Saylor is a hard case; an expert jail breaker.

Distance vs. Proximity.—This morning we had a pleasant call from Mr. U. K. Guthrie, of Marion, Ohio, correspondent of the *Mirror* of that town. He is also a contributor to the *Cleveland Leader* and *Cincinnati Enquirer*. It is his first visit to Utah, and he is pleasantly surprised at the appearance and condition of things generally. He says that he has been forced, since his arrival, to remove from his eyes the spectacles of prejudice which, on account of false reports, people generally wear in viewing Utah and its people from a distance.

In the case of this community the saying that "distance lends enchantment to the view" is reversed. Close inspection changes an ugly prospect to a comparatively pleasant picture. Mr. Guthrie presents but one instance among scores of thousands.

Curious Case of Blood Poisoning.—The Evanston *Chief* of Saturday says that, in the early part of the spring, Mrs. Jane Goodson, of Brown Park, Utah, while cutting potatoes for planting, accidentally gashed her hand, making a slight wound. About a month ago, while performing some chores about the farm, a thorn penetrated the wound and resulted in a case of blood poisoning that bid fair to result fatally. She was taken to Rock Springs for treatment, but apparently grew worse despite the physician's best efforts, and her son determined upon her removal to Salt Lake City. The journey was begun last Thursday, a compartment in one of the sleepers attached to No. 3 being secured. Reaching Evanston, Mrs. Goodson had become so much worse, that it became necessary to abandon the journey, and under Dr. Harker's care she was removed to the Evanston Hotel, where everything was done for her that skill could devise. She died about noon on Friday. A married daughter of the deceased resides at Ashley's Fork.

Come at Last.—The long looked for shower has come at last. At 2.30 this afternoon a thifty nature was refreshed by a copious rainfall. "There's millions in it."
