SOCIETY WOMAN WILL SELL PURE MILK.

Mrs. Scott Durand, of Chicago's exclusive suburb, Evanston, has entered into a contract to supply hygienically pure milk at 12 cents a quart from her Crab Tree Dairy, the Lake Forest prize milk farm. This dairy is operated on lines of perfect sanitation and only pedigreed cows which have won blue ribbons at stock shows are permitted within its sacred domain. For milk from such cows the wealthy residents of Evanston are ready to pay 5 cents more per quart than for the germ-infested article of common commerce and Mrs. Durand will at the same time make a neat profit from her enterprise. She is to begin with a dairy service of 250 gallons of milk.



BOSTON MILLINER A STRONG THAW WITNESS.

Mrs. J. J. Caine, of Boston, who went to New York to testify in favor of Harry K. Thaw, has long been a friend of the young wife of the man on trial for the killing of Stanford White. She testified that she had been an aural witness to an offer by Harry Thaw to settle \$100,000 on Evelyn Nesbit's mother, providing the latter obtained Evelyn's consent to marry him. She added that Harry Thaw's intentions toward Evelyn had always been honorable and that during her acquaintance with Evelyn Nesbit she had always given all her earnings to her mother. Mrs. Caine is holding a prominent position in the coterie of witnesses called by Thaw's lawyers.



IMPORTANT WITNESS AGAINST THAW.

It is believed in many quarters that District Attorney Jerome, who is conducting the prosecution in the trial of Harry K. Thaw for the killing of Stanford White, has a strong card in reserve in the person of Miss Hattie Forsythe, the chorus girl, who is expected to give the lie direct to Evelyn Nesbit Thaw. Miss Forsythe is said to have told the district attorney that she had in her possession proof that, on the night set by Evelyn Nesbit Thaw as the one on which she was dragged by White in the studio, White was not in New York. This would account for the care with which Mr. Jerome insisted upon having the exact date of that alleged outrage set by Evelyn when she was on the stand and a refutation of that testimony would be a heavy blow to the Thaw defense and to the faith of the jury in the truth of all the other statements made by the star witness in the famous case.

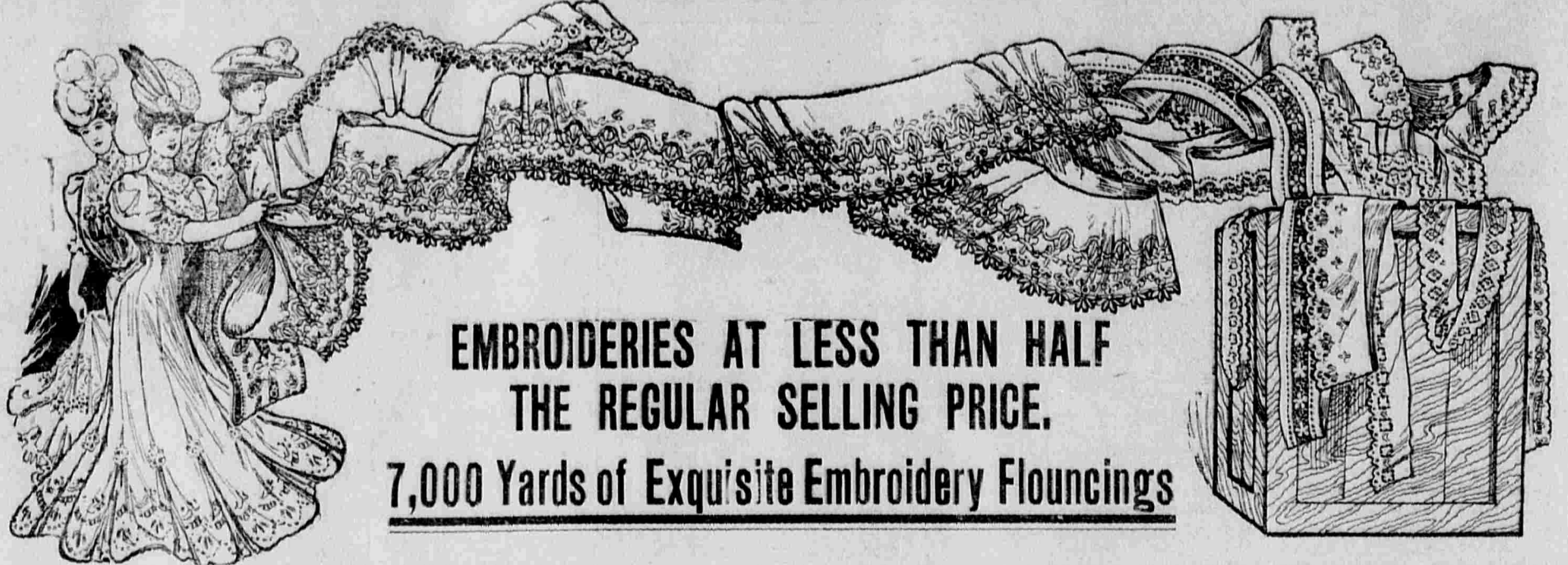

ITALY WANTS SHELLS FROM AMERICA.

"Mississippi shells are imported into Italy in considerable numbers, according to a report made by Consul James B. Dunning, of Milan. Italian Naples and Turin are the principal Italian centers of the pearl button trade of the peninsula, and, though there is a considerable list of makers in small places in the country, it is in the larger enterprises of the great cities that the American exporters of shells will find an opportunity to capture new trade. The source indicates that there is plenty of opportunity for the enterprising exporter of this class of goods.

any important volume to the United States. The Milan consular district shipped only \$1,350 worth of such goods to American ports during the year ending with June 30, 1906, but the proportions of the domestic market are sufficient to encourage the belief that American exporters of shells can thus find a larger field for their output. Several of the larger Italian button factories are already under contract to handle, and there are so handling, the shells shipped from New York and other American ports, and the demand is brisk, and information which reaches the consulate from a number of authentic sources indicates that there is plenty of opportunity for the enterprising exporter of this class of goods.

SHEEPMEN ROLL IN WEALTH.

Fortunes are being made by sheepmen of the southwest. Wool, which was 22c per lb on the range last year, now is being contracted for at 24 cents, and the prospect is that it will go still higher, says a message from Phoenix, Ariz., to the Drovers Journal. There was a time not so many years ago, when wool sold for 9 cents a pound, and when sheep had only a nominal value. The sheep owner's main profit is not from wool. It is derived from the sale of lambs. Good times and high wages appear to have inclined the American

public toward spring lamb, without regard to price. Range lambs which were anything less than yearlings sold on the Chicago market up to \$8.40 in July, 1906. This is higher than the average price for full-grown sheep. So the increase is sold as lambs, there being a saving of only a part of the ewe lambs for the increase of the flocks. There are no weathers in Arizona. Within 50 miles of Phoenix now are about 500,000 sheep driven down from the mountain ranges for lambing and shearing, and almost without exception the sheep are ewes or lambs.

One flockmaster reported an increase of 125 per cent, which means that twice as many lambs were sold as last year. An average will be 115 per cent of increase from which the loss will be less than 2 per cent.
