City Council Session—Work of Repairing Sidewalks Will Continue.

CITY COUNCIL SESSION.

No More Transient Street Merchants—June Weddings—Purple Day.

Provo, Utah Co., June 14.—At the meeting of the city council, held last evening, a largely signed petition from business men was presented, requesting that further license to do business on the sidewalks and streets be not granted. The petition set forth that it was an injustice to the petitioners, who did business off the sidewalk, to permit others to do business there, and that the matter of selling goods on the streets had been before the Commercial club, and that the petition had the backing of that body. Messrs. George S. Howe and L. O. Tait, who were present, addressed the council, setting forth the injustice of permitting transient or temporary dealers to come into town, and requesting that the petition be granted. The council, after a short discussion, decided to grant the petition, and the petitioners were notified that their petition had been granted.

SUCCESSFUL STAKE REUNION.

Hyrum, Cache County, June 11.—Olaf Wilford Ross was brought here a sick man from his home at Riverside, Ida., on April 10, and on the 8th instant he died after the performance of a surgical operation for cancer of the stomach. Funeral services were held on the 8th instant at the stake building, where a large gathering of sympathizing friends paid their last respects to the departed one. Deceased was born at Hyrum, April 3, 1872; married in Logan temple, April 10, 1895. He leaves a wife and four children, also two brothers, James and John. He held the office of an Elder and was a very exemplary young man.
