CONGRESSIONAL.

SENATE.

The Inundation Relief Bill.

WASHINGTON, 5.—The committee on appropriations reported back the bill appropriating \$30,000 for the sufferers by the overflow in Louisiana and Mississippi, with an additional section appropriating an additional \$50,000 for the issue of temporary supplies of food and clothing.

Edwards moved an amendment limiting the operation of the law to the last of September.

Alcorn urged the necessity of care in the distribution, as the negroes were not accustomed to work, saying that the U. S. was going to feed and clothe them. The Secretary of War should have the exclusive control of the fund, he declared that the cause of the overflow was the defective state of the levees, and he argued that the best means of relief would be for the U. S. to employ the negroes and hire poor people to work and repair them properly, so as to prevent a recurrence of such disasters.

After further debate, the bill was agreed to, which pointed Tipton's remark that the discussion had already been so prolonged that the sufferers must be dead, and the appropriation had better be for the funeral expenses.

The Senate resumed the consideration of the civil rights bill, and Gordon gave notice of an amendment striking out the clause relating to equality in schools. Adjourned.

HOUSE.

Important to Settlers on Railway Lands.—The Centennial Bill.

WASHINGTON, 5.—A bill passed permitting railroad companies having land grants, to select other lands in their hands held by actual settlers under the pre-emption laws, and where the entry was filed previous to the grant.

A resolution was adopted instructing the committee to inquire whether any of the employees of the U. S. or of the District government have been employed in any conspiracy to defeat or hinder the investigation, and particularly to inquire into the circumstances connected with the late robbery of the safe in the office of the U. S. District Attorney.

The House then went into a committee of the whole on the Centennial bill, Kelly opening the debate in support of the bill. He said the appropriation was a small one compared with what was given by foreign countries for similar exhibitions, and declared that it would be the best investment ever made by Congress, not only in a material sense, but it would show the world that we were a united and prosperous country.

Hale, of Maine, opposed the bill for two general reasons—one, that the Treasury was empty; the other, that the bill was introduced with a plea that all that Congress was asked for was a formal sanction of the enterprise. He also criticized the preference shown in the bill over more important measures.

Packard and Tremaine advocated the bill.

The committee took a recess till evening, for the consideration of the Indian appropriation bill.

EASTERN.

President Watson Resigned.

Boston, 5.—President Watson of the Erie road has resigned, which is the directorship of the N. Y. and New England Railroad.
