## SCHOOL ELECTION BILL.

Some discussion has obtained over a proposed change in the method of electing school trustees. A bill has been presented to present the legislature, having for its object, to delete the election of school boards, in cities of the first and second class, on the day of general elections; and the election, at the same time, of superintendents of schools for such cities. The latter provision seems to carry more opposition in some quarters than the former. It is as follows:
