BIG FRUIT ASSN. INCORPORATED

McGriff Orchard & Commission Company Will Operate With A Capital of \$150,000.

figden, Feb. 6 .- The McGriff Orchard & Commission company has filed articles of incorporation with the county clerk for one of the largest fruit grow ing and shipping concerns in the country. The capital stock of the company is \$150,000 divided into shares of the par value of \$1 each. The company will acquire the orchard and fruit industry established in North Ogden and elsewhere by E. G. McGriff, At North Ogden his property consists of about 200 acres of orchards and vineyards and a packing plant.

The new corporation means the beginning of the fruit business of Weber county of a maining scale. 
