FACTIONAL FIGHT BETWEEN GREEKS

Tom Nikolatos Taken to Hospital In Serious Condition, Victim of Four Assailants.

NORTH WEBER CONFERENCE.

Victims of Freight Wreek Leave Small Fortunes-Salt Lake Auto Wrecks Buggy Through Fast Driving.

Ogden, March 29 .- As a result of a factional fight between two Greeks employed by the Ogden Rapid Transit company in Ogden canyon yesterday morning, Tom Nicolatos is at the Ogden general hospital in a dangerous condition, and Jim Japantes, said to be chiefly responsible for his injuries, is looked up at the county jail.

For the past two weeks there has For the pain two weeks there has been a spirit of antagonism between two factions of Greeks in this city. The police have been called upon to inter-fore on several occasions in petty quar-rels which have found their way into police court. Nothing of a scrous na-ture occurred, however, until yesterday morning, when Nikolatos and another Greek got into a dispute over a trivial matter near the rock quarry in Oxdon matter near the rock quarry in Ogden canyon, Japantes interfered, drawing n revolver and beading Nikolatos over the head a number of times. the head a number of times. Eratakiros Japantes and George Japantes, relatives of Jim Japantes, and N. K. Stefatos also set upon Nikolatos, kicking and beating him almost into insensibility. After the assault had been made the men brought their victim to the city, Dr. J. S. Gordon was called to attend the injured. Later County Physician Pidcock examined the wounded man and ordered him removed to the hospi-tal, where it is believed he is suffering from internal injuries. Upon informa-tion furnished by Heracles Counades Pete Messaries and Spirol Messaries, triends of the injured man, Japantes was placed under arrest. The other three men implicated in the affair will probably be arrested today.
